## BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Hold Back Temptation To Jump on With the Ace

When the declarer leads a singleton from the board and you hold the ace of the suit, the temptation to go up is very strong. From my observation, the ace is played nine times out of 10 in this situation. But it is the correct play much less than 90 per cent of the time.

Sometimes it is obvious, of course, that if you don't take your ace, you will not win another trick on the hand. At other times, however, logical reasoning will tell you that the play of the ace will ruin your chances of defeating the contract, whereas playing low will at least keep those chances alive.

Follow Mr. Masters' reasoning in today's deal. His partner opened the nine of clubs against the spade slam and Mr. Champion won with the ace in his own hand. Two rounds of trumps were taken, ending on the board. Now dummy's 10 of hearts was led and it was up to Mr. Masters.

He played low after thinking along these lines: Mr. Meek's lead of the nine of clubs was clearly top of nothing. Mr. Meek had three clubs or less. With as many as four clubs he would have led his fourth highest.

As for the diamond suit, Mr. Masters could see in his hand and dummy all but Q, J, 10, 7, 3 of the suit. If Mr. Champion had two diamonds or less, dummy's ace and king would assure him of no losers. If he had more than two diamonds, then he must have at least one of the honors (Q, J or 10). In this latter case, Mr. Meek could not have more than two cards in the suit and even if they were both honors, they would fall under the ace and king. Therefore, there were no tricks for the defenders in diamonds.

It was too much to hope for a trick in the trump suit and it became clear that, if the slam could be beaten, it would have to be beaten in hearts and clubs. So Mr. Masters ducked the heart lead and Mr. Meek won with the king. Subsequently, there was no way for Mr. Champion to avoid the loss of a club trick.

If Mr. Masters had played his ace of hearts at trick four, Mr. Meek's king could have been ruffed out, setting up a heart winner in the closed hand on which a club could have been discarded from dummy.

### Drug Addiction Research Plan Gets Approval

VANCOUVER (CP)—Ottawa has approved plans for British Columbia to become the first province to undertake research into the sociological aspects of narcotics addiction.

A spokesman for the B.C. Health Department said here Monday a telegram suggesting an immediate start on setting up the project has come from the federal Health Department. Tentative plans call for research by University of British Columbia scientists through interviews with addicts at Oakalla prison.

This research would be designed to uncover causes for addiction and formulate possible steps for the rehabilitation of addicts.

VANCOUVER (CP)—Further purchases of B.C. salmon by the United Kingdom are dependent upon an increase in British dollar earnings, Sir Andrew Jones, head of the British Food Mission to Ottawa, said here Monday.
