AUSTRALIAN ELECTION ON

Greatest Political Struggle in History of Commonwealth Being Decided Today

CANBERRA, Australia, Nov. 16.—The national triennial Commonwealth election being held today will probably go down to history as the hardest fought political struggle since federation. Premier Bruce and his federal treasurer have forced the appeal to the country on the question of law and order and industrial peace. The Government is opposed to strikes and has in the course of recent waterfront strikes taken an active part in preventing pressure being brought on working men to force them into a union or to cease work at the call of the leaders.

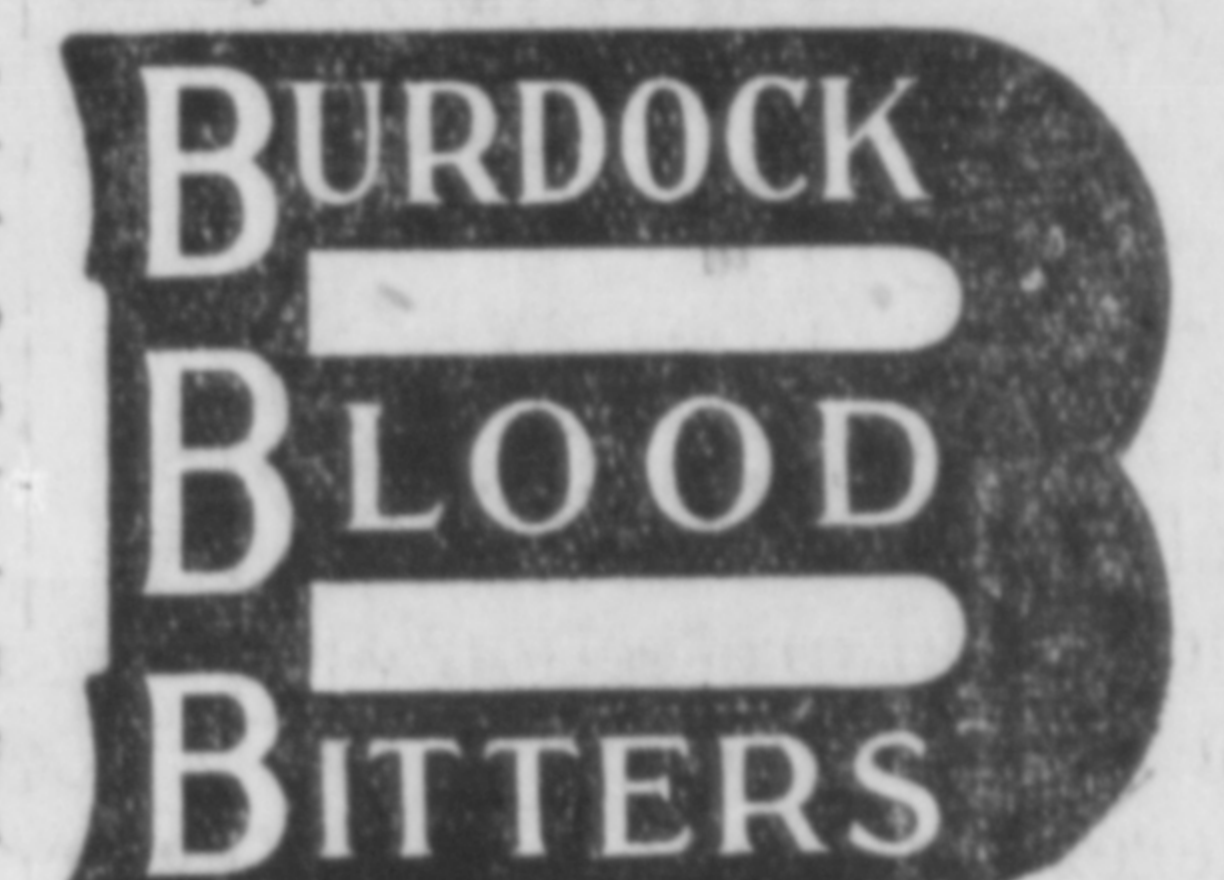
The Labor party lead by J. H. Scullin does not defend its strike policy, but attacks the Government on other issues. The Labor party has promised to revise the Arbitration act, to give a business administration, to amend the Crimes Act to prevent it being used against decent working men, the abolition of expensive commissions, and, finally, to repair the breaches in the tariff wall to prevent manufactured imports from flooding the country. They have also promised to take a referendum on proposed changes in the constitution, to restore the system of making per capita grants to the Australian states, to promote organized marketing and the unification of railway gauges.
