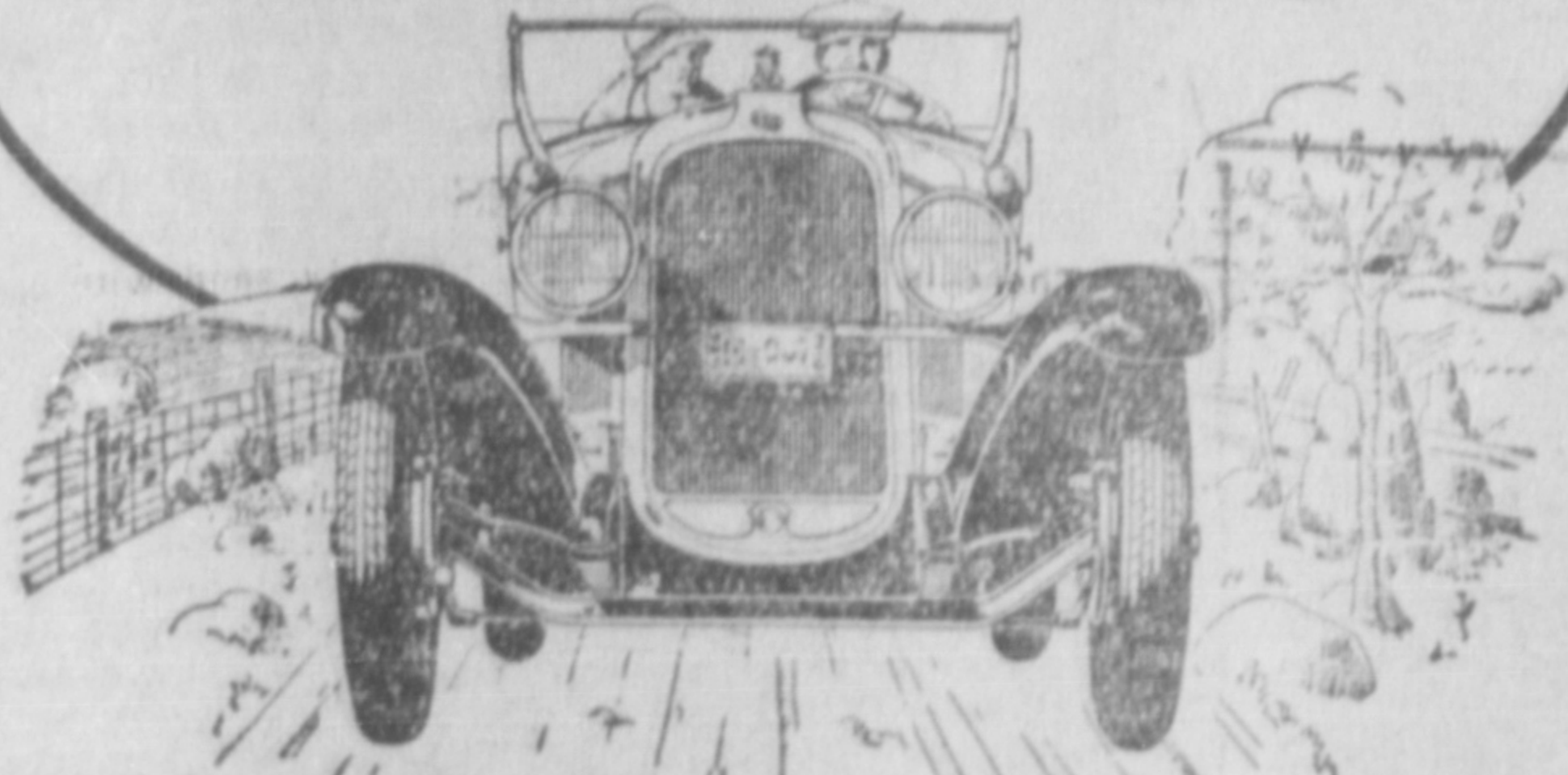

MAKES PROTEST CLOSING PLANT

GEORGE BUSHBY OBJECTS TO ILLEGAL EXPORT OF HERRING WHEN HE GETS NONE

The plant of the Rupert Marine Products Ltd. is today shut down because they cannot get the herring to keep them going whereas fresh herring caught in Pearl Harbor are being shipped in bulk to Ketchikan. Against this George Bushby, president and general manager of the company makes a strong protest.

Mr. Bushby says that this spring he made all preparations for the opening of the season, installed a new engine in one of his boats and put the plant in order. He took about 500 tons of fish and got under way when, owing to regulations discriminating against him he has had to pay off his men and close down.

When it was a question of local fishermen getting their bait, Mr. Bushby says he made no complaint but he does not think a local industry should be closed down when fish are being exported in bulk instead of boxed as per regulations and caught in seines instead of gillnets contrary to regulations.

Early in the season a fishery regulation was passed stating that no herring should be taken in Pearl Harbor and no herring pound established there. Both these regulations were broken and fish were taken there in quantities and a pound established. That was the only place the fish could be obtained. Then on application to Ottawa, American fishermen were allowed to take these Canadian fish while his industry is closed down.

In the local reduction plant the fish is converted into edible fish meal for poultry feeding purposes and the oil used for soap making. These are manufactured products worth more than the fresh fish and employing local labor in producing them. The shutting down of the plant is a serious loss to Prince Rupert and one that should not necessarily be permitted.

CATALA TO RETURN TO SERVICE EARLY IN MONTH OF APRIL

The Union Steamship Co. expects to have the steamer Catala, which is undergoing extensive repairs at the Burrard dry dock at North Vancouver, following her stranding on Mist Island near Port Simpson early last November, back in service early next month. She should be in Prince Rupert again on the northbound call here on either April 1 or April 8.

Soon after the return to service of the Catala, the Union Steamship Co. will institute its summer schedule of sailings with the Cardena returning to the Naas as well as the Skena River cannyer run and the Camosun, which has been relieving the Catala during the past winter, going back to Bella Coola, Rivers Inlet and Ocean Falls run.
