

MARCH COUNTY COURT CASES

ONE NEW CASE UP FOR HEARING—ANOTHER TRANSFERRED TO SUPREME COURT LIST OF ACTIONS

Only one new case has arisen for the consideration of the County Court this month. This is the action of three Port Clements plaintiffs who are suing Alex Yeltatzie, seineboat owner, for work done aboard a boat on which they were employed in addition to their duties as fishermen. The claims aggregate some \$300. The defence is that the work in question is generally considered to be included in the duties of men employed upon fishing boats.

The case of B. Brynildsen & Sons, Ltd. vs. Gus Egan et al. which has been on the County Court list for some time, has been transferred to the Supreme Court for hearing. Plaintiff originally claimed \$818.25 on a promissory note but a counter claim exceeding the County Court jurisdiction of \$1000 has been entered. Cost of machinery alleged by defendant to have been removed by plaintiff and damages is sought.

At the regular monthly session of County Court this morning before Judge F. McB. Young naturalization applications of S. W. Sjonstand, Ter-
