FINE FOOTBALL GAME PLAYED

LOCALS MADE IT A DRAW WITH DURBAN THREE GOALS EACH

The return game between the Durban and Prince Rupert football teams resulted in a draw 3-3 after the finest game seen in the city for many a day.

Both teams turned out as selected and with the advantage of wind, sun hill, the navy early attacked. McHardy was a dangerous centre who kept his wings well supplied with long passes and who shot often and with power. From a corner kick Bryant put the sailors a goal up with a shot than went in without any assistance. Rupert got away through Baptie and Warren but Mitchell failed. Durban half backs were not standing on ceremony and gave dilatory forwards little time for developing attacks. The navy attacked again and Haig misjudged his distance from the goal line and turned the ball in to put the sailors two goals up. Rupert were not disheartened and the game became faster and more vigorous. Baptie was upset in the goal mouth but the home team were not to be denied and Warren beat Kerswell completely to score for Rupert. The navy had to defend now and Mitchell and Wilson crossed centres that were cleared with difficulty. A beautiful bout of combination from Wilson to Macdonald to Currie to Warren to Mitchell who centred accurately gave Dickens the chance to put the teams level with a dandy header. Ere the cheers had died down Bryant got away and a poor shot was let through to put the sailors in the lead again. Corbett saved brilliantly at full length shortly after and then the Rupert team attacked but no score was registered and half time found the visitors leading 3-2.

After half-time it was all Rupert's game. Save for several breakaways all of which were dangerous, the Navy were defending. McHardy, Dunlop and Bryant missed several chances but it was Kerswell who was the harassed goalkeeper. Baptie fired a beauty just over. Warren had a fine shot well held by Kerswell. Wilson centred dangerously repeatedly but the Navy defence held. Mitchell and Warren were nearly through. Rees cleared again and again. Currie headed over from two corners by Wilson. Baptie crossed a ball that beat everybody in the defence but it went just outside. Play was very fast and the crowd were on tiptoes. At length Wilson gave a fine through pass to Baptie who took it in his stride and went through to score with the best shot of the match. Rupert forced several corners but all were cleared and in spite of maintained pressure the Navy kept their goal intact and full time came with the score a draw, 3-3.

Leading Seaman Payne made a fine referee who believed in solid body charging and who did not hold up the game for technical and minor infractions. A Clapperton and Leading Seaman Stoneman were on the line.

SPORT CHAT

There have been numerous opinions expressed that the unfair decision of Monday night in denying Percy Lake of H.M.S. Durban his well-earned decision over Johnny Woods of Seattle while "kill" boxing in Prince Rupert. While it may not be as serious as that, it nevertheless will not tend to do the game here any good. It was a pity that the fine and otherwise excellently handled card that was offered that night should have had so unfortunate

and heartily criticized conclusion. This fight, it may be assumed, was an important one to the young stoker and clever a lightweight as has ever been seen here, and, while he and his companions are doubtless good sports, they cannot be blamed if the treatment they were given will rankle in their minds for some time. They may however, get some satisfaction out of the fact that Prince Rupert boxing fans as a whole are with them and that the decision was just as unpopular with the local boxing followers as it may have been on the ship.

The referee and judge who awarded the draw may also have found by now that, if they were themselves totally blind or fast asleep as far as the merits of the bout were concerned, the people who watched the fight were not and their decision was rightly not appreciated. There were few who saw the fight who will not admit that Lake continuously outpointed his opponent and in skill and science was easily the superior. Nor is Johnny Woods criticized. He showed himself to be a fine little boxer and an excellent sport and probably he realized as well as anybody who was there, except the judges and the referee, that he was up against a better man. It would be a satisfactory thing if arrangements could be made whereby these two boys could meet again before the Durban leaves the coast to settle their differences under impartial and more skillful adjudication than they were accorded here.
