During the month of January, the heating system of the city hall used 2382 gallons of oil according to report presented to the council last night by the jamitor, John Walker Exley. The average daily consumption was 77 galons at a cost of \$4.23.

C. N. The Prince Charles, which has been in dry dock here all winter, will take up the John's run when she is withdrawn.

The city council last night gave first reading to the idemnity bylaw providing for the salaries of the mayor and aldermen during the year 1928. The mayor will receive the usual \$1500 and each alderman, \$300. Failure to attend balf the meetings in a month will result in a city father losing half of his pay and, if he misses all meetings, he will get no money, providing of course. that absence is not due to sickness or citybusiness.
