

DEDICATED LIFE OF WHITE-ROBED INFANT

LONDON, March 12.—An old custom dating back to the middle ages was revived at Bedworth, Nottinghamshire, recently. The mother of the last baptised male child took the white-robed infant to church. She handed it to the vicar, Rev. J. Lowdell, who presented it before the altar and dedicated its life to God. Then he laid it in an old wooden cradle draped in white and adorned with flowers and evergreens, with candles burning at both ends. The baby was rocked several times and was then handed back to the mother. Afterwards the congregation sang the Nunc Dimittis.
