## CONVENTION AT SMITHERS WAS IMPORTANT ONE

Recommendations That More In-  
formation Be Secured For  
Settlers—Medical Men  
Wanted.

At Smithers last week the big convention held in the interests of the farmers of the province which was largely attended found that the greatest difficulty in regard to getting settlers to take up land was that there was not enough ready information to be had from reliable sources as to what are the exact conditions for the new comer. A committee has been appointed to look into this matter and will confer with the government as to the possibilities of establishing a sort of bureau of information which can state things definitely to outsiders who are seeking land.

Another difficulty encountered was that much of the land was being held by men who had not yet completed sale but were holding it up for themselves, and if the prospective settler wanted land he had to pay dearly for it.

The party had several discussions with Dr. Winch who urges rapid action in regard to procuring further medical services for the northern district. Where there are so many settlers conditions ought to be such that people could be given attention whenever it is necessary without having to come to the outside for it. It was suggested that the government will probably have to put in a doctor who will receive a salary as there are not enough residents to meet the heavy expense of travelling.

The delegates arrived on the train Sunday and returned to the south and it is expected as an outcome of the visit that the farmers of the interior will be greatly benefited for all the members are highly surprised and delighted with the wonderful advantages of northern B. C. as far as mixed farming is concerned.

## EVIDENCE BEFORE OTTAWA COST OF LIVING COMMITTEE

Increase in Cost of Handling Has  
Increased According to  
Witness.

Ottawa, June 30.—Investigations into the high cost of living are still being continued here. Evidence given before the Parliamentary Committee showed that prior to the war stockings, for which the manufacturers were paid 37½ cents a pair, cost the consumer 75c. For the same quality now the manufacturer receives 78½ cents and the consumer pays \$2.50. This statement was made by Richard Thompson of the Canadian Woolen Manufacturers' Association.

At the meeting of the City Council on Monday night it was decided to increase the license fee on automobiles plying for hire to \$10 every half year. The present fee is \$2.50.

## SELL FOR CASH OR GIVE LONG CREDIT ON CITY PROPERTY

Council to Decide Next Week How  
It Will Market Lots.

In considering a bylaw to dispose of the property held by the city in Section 2, the City Council Monday night decided to take legal advice as to whether it had the right to give credit.

Alderman Perry was anxious that easy terms should be given at the sale in order to encourage building. The mayor and several aldermen agreed that it might be a good idea, but the city clerk feared that it would not be legal. It was decided to take advice before proceeding.
