### SOCCER GAMES FOR TOMORROW

Big English Cup-tie Contests to be Played With Keen Competition

DRAWN ARE MADE

LONDON, Eng., Jan. 13.—The first set of that great national sporting drama—the round in which the major clubs enter the English Football Association cup competition—is scheduled to take place tomorrow. Previous rounds have sifted out the little fellows and the weaklings in the minor divisions of the English league. The same keenness which has marked the public interest in the competition in past years is reported to exist this season. The luck of the draw has favored the big clubs and has swung directly against the southern clubs and the amateurs.

In all probability the first division teams will be found to have a bigger proportion of clubs in the next round than usual. There are only three instances where first division teams are opposing one another. Eight third division clubs are drawn against first division teams and in six of them the latter have ground advantage. London teams have not been generously treated. A dozen of the city's clubs, including the great amateur club of the Corinthians, are interested. The Arsenal are the only seniors to be drawn at home. Millwall, playing the game of their lives this year and heading the standing in the southern section of the third division, are lucky. They meet Derby county at home and should be confident of the outcome as they beat this team in the fourth round at Derby last year. The London Caledonians, an amateur club, are also at home and must meet Crewe Alexandra. Another London tie will be Charlton Athletic versus Bury.

Among the games in which the first division teams play each other, the best will likely be the meeting of Blackburn Rovers and Newcastle United. Newspaper prophets have picked the following to win: Corinthians, Bury, Clapton Orient, Aston Villa, Blackburn Rovers, Middlesbrough, Leicester City, Cardiff City, Everton, Sheffield United. The Wednesday, Huddersfield Town, Bolton Wanderers, Sunderland, Oldham Athletic, Port Vale, Reading, Manchester City, Notts Forest, Stoke City, Swansea Town and Rotherham United. ### OPTIMISTIC NOTE

President J. K. Gordon then addressed the meeting and struck an optimistic note by saying that the past year had been one of notable success and improvement not only in our own district but throughout the province and whole dominion, and asked that in the coming year all should endeavor to make it even more prosperous in the broader sense than before. To do this it was necessary to be more tolerant, more understanding and willing to display a more hopeful and helpful spirit among each other. He said he would like to see everyone interested in the Board of Trade and especially the farmers who were so necessary to the prosperity of the district. He felt that production methods were fairly well understood and carried out but there was undoubtedly great need of better organization and co-operation in the marketing and distribution of produce, and attendance at the Board meetings would assist in overcoming this drawback.
