WAUSAU, Wisconsin, Aug. 15.—President Coolidge declared before the Wisconsin state American Legion today that the Kellogg pact holds greater hope for peaceful MILLIO relations than any that was ever before given to the world.

THE PAS, Aug. 15.-Lost for 48 days during which he wandered aimlessly through the densely wooded country north of here, Andy Taylor a local prospector, was found by searchers near Burnt Lake and brought by airplane here.
