CROP PROSPECTS FAVORABLE

Prospects for a satisfactory wheat crop have seldom, if ever, been more favorable at the end of June, than in 1928, says the Royal Bank of Canada monthly letter. The general conditions are similar to those existing in 1923, when one of the largest crops in the history of the West was produced. Recent rains have provided sufficient moisture to take care of the crops for two or three weeks to come, and very little damage has been done by cut worms, frost or floods. According to the Northwest Grain Dealers Association, the estimated acreage for 1928 in the prairie provinces amounts to 23,558,000 acres as compared with 20,879,000 acres for the large crop year of 1923 and 21,426,000 acres in 1927. This acreage, then, if correct, breaks all previous records. Although wet weather in the early spring somewhat delayed seeding, operations in the other parts of Canada, the present outlook for a good yield is favorable. In Ontario, the nay crop is expected to be short and light in yield, but in the Maritimes the prospects for a large crop are bright. Fruit trees in Ontario, British Columbia and the Maritimes have suffered comparatively little injury, and it is estimated that the fruit crop will be in excess of last year's.
