Carnation Peach Salad

12 large halves of canned peaches, 1 cup white cherries, 1/2 cup hazel nuts or almonds, Carnationnaise, crisp lettuce leaves, 12 ripe olives. Remove pits from cherries, insert nuts; place 3 or 4 nuts in hollow of each peach. Put two halves on bed of lettuce; garnish with 2 ripe olives. Serve with Carnation-




