CAMPAIGN MANAGER

Rules Must be Followed and Today's Big Advertisement Should be Read

Campaign headquarters will remain open until 8 o'clock tonight and until 8 o'clock Wednesday night, September 12, for the purpose of checking the vote, point and cash totals with the separate candidates.

Even though you are sure your vote and point records are O.K., you should call at campaign headquarters and verify your cash total with the records the campaign department has for you. This is real important as on these figures the commissions will be paid to the active non-prize winning candidates.

If there are any errors now is the time to correct them—not later. As announced elsewhere in these columns NO CORRECTIONS will be made after 8 p.m. Wednesday, September 12. The only exceptions we will make on this are those which must be made for the convenience of out-of-town candidates.

Any candidate who does not call at campaign headquarters and verify his or her vote point and cash totals will be considered as having given notice to the judges. The Prince Rupert Daily News and the campaign management that they accept, as absolutely correct, the records of their accounts as The Daily News' campaign department has them.

Before depositing your subscriptions in the sealed ballot box be sure to obtain a statement from the campaign department to put in with your final remittance. Do not put subscriptions and free voting coupons in the same envelope.

It is imperative that every candidate thoroughly understands the rules governing the closing of the campaign. Detailed information is contained in today's News in a page ad. under the heading "Details of the Final Count." In the event you do not understand what you read you are not only invited but are urged to seek further information at campaign headquarters. Ignorance of the rules will constitute no excuse. FINNISH PEOPLE  
IN CANADA TODAY  
SEVENTY THOUSAND

TORONTO, Sept. 11.—(CP)—Adiel Saariimaki, vice-consul for the republic of Finland, interested a crowd of exhibition guests in the Women's Building in his address on "Finnish people in Canada." There were now between 60,000 and 70,000 Finnish people resident in Canada and from 4,000 to 6,000 newcomers were arriving annually in the Dominion. The exodus from Finland to the United States had been much greater but it was a case of going there to work and make money, later coming to Canada to buy their homes and settle, he said.

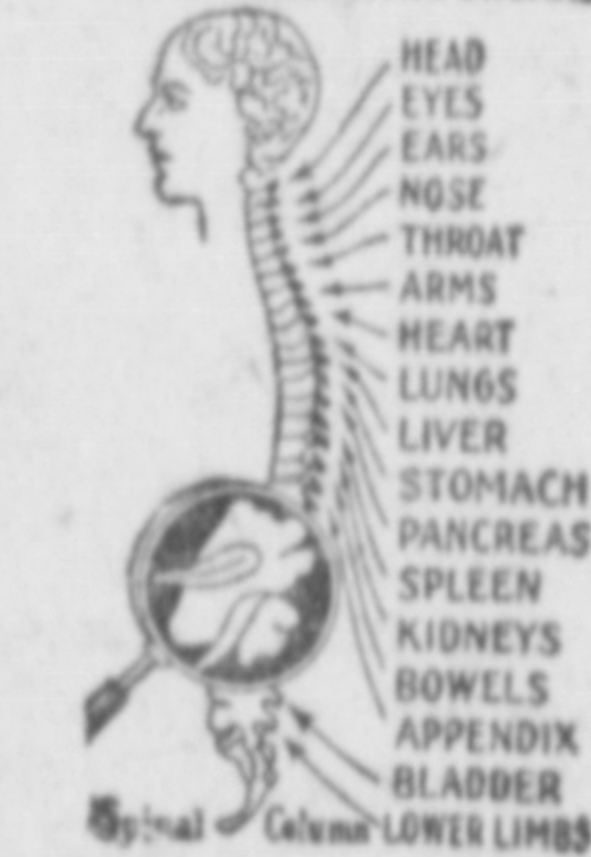
