THREE MEN BURIED IN A LANDSLIDE

STRONG ARGUMENT IN FAVOR OF PINE RIVER PASS ROUTE

Arguments in Favor of Pine River Pass Route into the Peace Country

The Pine Pass route from Peace River to the coast which is favored by the local joint committee of the city council and board of trade would involve 265 miles of new construction from Peace River to Fort Fraser and it is estimated the new work laid with 10 pound rails and allowing 1 per cent maximum grade could be built for \$12,100,000, or \$46,000 a mile. This route is also favored by the Alberta Government engineer. Adding the distance from Peace River to Prince Rupert 370 miles, makes the total haul from Peace Coupe to Prince Rupert 635 miles. HOUSE DIVIDES ON AMENDMENTS

BOURASSA OBJECTS TO PASSING OF MEASURE AND IS BOOED BY MEMBERS

OTTAWA, March 14.—The Progressive sub-amendment to the budget was defeated last night 171 to 20 and the Conservative amendment was defeated 156 to 76. The vote on the budget itself was never taken today when Henri Bourassa, independent, objected to its being taken because it was after eleven o'clock and without the unanimous consent of the House to continue the speaker adjourned the sitting. Private members voted Bourassa as he left the chamber.

FLYERS SEEN ON ATLANTIC

UNIDENTIFIED AND SUPPOSED FAIR COMPANION WINNING WAY TO NEWFOUNDLAND

LONDON, March 14.—Two fliers in a monoplane are today presumably winging their way toward Newfoundland from Cranwell. One is Walter Hinchinck, who took off mysteriously yesterday and all indications point to his companion being Hon. Eisle Mackay, daughter of Lord Inchcape. The plane was seen at several points in Northern Ireland and later was reported by an unnamed steamer which was four days out of Bourdeaux.

274 BODIES OF VICTIMS FOUND

ERUPTING OF ST. FRANCIS RESERVOIR DAM RESULTED IN HEAVY TOLL OF LIVES

NEWHALL, California, March 14.—The catastrophe by which a large number of people lost their lives when the dam at the St. Francis reservoir burst and the flood swept the valley below, was not exaggerated. Up to last night 274 bodies of victims had been recovered.

Two Government Measures Are Given Second Reading in the Legislature Following Debate

VICTORIA, March 14.—The government's new plan to tax the profits on the sale of natural resources through a system of control of completion allowances was approved on the second reading of the bill in the Legislature yesterday. The bill was advanced to the committee stage without a division.

The House approved the government's request for authority to borrow four millions for the completion of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway this year if the negotiations for the sale of the line meets with failure.

After the morning and afternoon debate the House carried the second reading by 25 to 17. All Liberals voted for the measure which was also supported by Stoddart, the provincial, and four labor members Burden, Uphill, Brown and Neelands. Conservatives concentrated their criticisms on the previous Government announcements of the early completion of the road.

LEGISLATURE IS PROROGUED

VICTORIA, March 14.—The end of the legislative session came rather suddenly this afternoon when the Lieutenant Governor appeared and the House was formally prorogued.

N.Y. RANGERS WERE BEATEN BY CANADIENS

FIRST POSITION PRACTICALLY CLINCHED LAST NIGHT; MAROONS ARE SECOND

TORONTO, March 14.—The Canadiens practically clinched the first position by beating the New York Rangers, while the loss to the latter was a severe setback because Boston went six points ahead by beating Detroit. The Maple Leafs of Toronto, although having the edge in the first half of the game against Ottawa and even during the rest of the play, found themselves unable to break the tie with Ottawa, even though they used the four man attack. Their play-off chances are now nearly lost. Montreal Maroons strengthened their hold on second place with Detroit and Pittsburgh still tied for third position. PSYCHOPATHIC HOSPITAL AT VANCOUVER RECOMMENDED AND STERILIZING OF MENTALLY ABNORMAL

Fortunes Won and Lost Within Past Few Days in Radio Common Stock and American Linseed Jumps

NEW YORK, March 14.—Radio Corporation common stock in which several fortunes have been made and lost within the past few days in a meteoric advance of more than \$60 a share during eight sessions was lower at \$133 this morning but climbed back to \$142 in a few minutes. The general market opened reactionary but turned upward. With a jump of nearly six dollars a share to \$100 American Linseed made a gain of nearly \$20 in two days.
