(Special to Daily News) NEW YORK, April 15.—St. Louis Browns made it four straight wins by defeating Chicago White Sox 4 to 3 in a hard fought game yesterday afternoon. New York Yankees, idle both Saturday and Sunday on account of unfavorable weather, are occupying second place with two wins while Cleveland Indians and Washington Senators round out the early season first division with three victories and one loss each. The Indians suffered their first defeat yesterday when Detroit Tigers won their first game. Philadelphia Athletics are still in the cellar as a result of two defeats by the Yankees. New York Giants won their third game from Philadelphia in the National League yesterday. St. Louis Cardinals dropped their first game to Chicago Cubs on Saturday but came back and beat them again yesterday. Brooklyn Dodgers are now in third place through defeating Boston yesterday and the Cincinnati Reds, who broke even with Pittsburgh Pirates at the week-end, are in fourth place.

Around The World With Sport Fans

(By The Trump) The centenary of the Oxford and Cambridge boat races is to be celebrated next year, the first race having been rowed in 1829. This is a classic sport event in which practically all the people of the United Kingdom are interested and in all English speaking countries the results are watched keenly.

Lacrosse players are rather worked up over the controversy in regard to the eligibility of four reinstated players to compete in the Mann Cup. An eastern sports writer defending the western team says: "The whole matter was investigated at New Westminster, B.C. last year, and it was decided then that the men in question were in good standing, and that there was no possible way to debar them from Mann Cup competition. Before the series started investigation was made into the status of the men complained of, and the president at that time ruled that if these men had been reinstated by the Dominion registration board of the Amateur Athletic union of Canada they were eligible to play in all amateur games in Canada. If they had been reinstated by the B.C. body only they would only be eligible to play in that province, and not in the Mann Cup playdown. Further investigation disclosed that the men under fire had been reinstated at the St. John, N.B., meeting of the A.A.U. of C., and were therefore eligible for Mann Cup play. These facts were laid before the C.A.L.A. lacrosse meeting at Westminster, and there was no further objection voiced."

There is a bill before Parliament in England providing that dog races shall come under a local option provision giving localities the right to say whether they shall have the races in their boundaries or not. The bill is a private one and may not pass the House.

Should Blackburn Rovers win the English football cup this year they will equal Aston Villa's record of six victories. Huddersfield has appeared in two finals but won only once, in 1922. Four of their present players were in the team at that time. The game takes place Saturday.

U.S. IMMIGRATION LAW CIRCUMVENTED

Nine Italians Secure Admission to That Country on Habeas Corpus

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y., April 16.—United States Immigration Ruling 86, under which 30,000 foreign-born Canadian residents have been denied admission to the United States, and which, after being declared illegal by Federal courts, has been repeatedly enforced by American Immigration authorities, was circumvented here when nine Italian residents of Canada were admitted into this country on writs of habeas corpus secured by Preston M. Albro, Buffalo, lawyer, from Federal Judge John R. Hazel. Two of the men were denied admission to the United States Wednesday on the ground that the Federal authorities at Washington had not informed United States immigration officials here of the Circuit Court declaration that Ruling 86 was illegal, and were sent back to Canada for quota visas. They refused to apply for these, since the whole point of controversy is that, inasmuch as Ruling 86 has been declared illegal, no need for quota visas exists.
