ADVANTAGE OF NATIONAL LINE

AMERICAN SHIPS HAVE TO LOWER RATES TO COMPETE WITH CANADIANS

NEW YORK, April 16.—Reduction of rates \$1.00 a ton on automobiles shipped from New York to Australia was announced by the Roosevelt Steamship Lines, operating the American-Australian Line for the Shipping Board; by Funch, Edge & Company, operating the Cunard service, and by Norton, Lilley & Company, agents for the Ellerman Lines. It was indicated that a further reduction will be made if competition with the Canadian Merchant Marine demands it.

The revision of rates is the result of a preferential tariff in effect in Australia, under which the port of shipment is considered the point of origin of motor cars so long as the port is in British territory, while the city in which the cars are manufactured is the point of origin when the city is in territory other than British. Detroit manufacturers, the American shipping man says, ship their cars across the Canadian border at a small charge, and thence to Montreal, where they are loaded aboard ships of the Canadian Merchant Marine.

FREIGHT IS ADDED
Were these cars shipped to New York, the logical point, and then loaded on ships for transfer to Australia, the freight cost from Detroit to New York would be added to the cost of the car as estimated for the tariff at Australia. It is said. When shipped via Montreal the freight cost from Detroit is not considered. The carriers operating from New York estimate that the difference brought about by this condition is about \$1.00 a ton, and with no change in the basis of the tariff apparent they have agreed that a lower freight rate is the solution.

HALIBUT PRICES ARE STILL LOW

TOTAL OF 267,500 POUNDS SOLD AT FISH EXCHANGE WITH 10.5c AND 5c HIGH BID

Halibut prices at the local Fish Exchange this morning averaged, if anything, a little lower than those which were paid on Saturday. Then American vessels sold 161,500 pounds at bids ranging from 9.7c and 5c to 10.5c and 6c while four Canadians disposed of 46,000 pounds at from 7.6c and 5c to 8.8c and 5c. Parry, dictator, and Jack Judge, prelate, duly opened the service, the feature of which was the flower ceremony in which the secretary, Percy Cameron, called the names of the deceased members three times. When no reply was made, the sergeant-at-arms, D. C. Schubert, placed a flower in the altar in each case. The oration was given by B. M. Simpson and the program included vocal solos by Mrs. F. W. Allen, S. A. McPherson, and Mrs. Swanson; a trombone solo by W. H. Derry, a violin and piano duet by Misses Molly and Nellie Lawrence. Hymns were "Lead, Kindly Light" and "Nearer My God to Thee."

The order of service for the Women of Mooseheart Legion was in charge of the senior regent, Mrs. Helen Nickerson, and chaplain, Mrs. Elizabeth Slaggard. FIRE AT CASA LOMA SATURDAY

FIVE LOST LIVES AND OTHERS MAY DIE RESULT OF APARTMENT BLAZE

WINNIPEG, April 16.—The death list from Casa Loma fire of Saturday stood yesterday at five with seven injured in the hospital, one probably fatally and many others, including men, women and children receiving minor injuries. The dead are W. F. McNeil, Gregorjus Heaka, Mrs. F. Hamilton, Mrs. W. F. Gaster and George Douglas. Mrs. Heake, whose husband is dead, is not expected to survive. She fractured both her legs and it is possible her back is broken.

The seriously injured in addition to Mrs. K. Heake, were George Thorpe, 37, caretaker; David Yeddeau, district fire chief; Mrs. R. Vandewater, L. C. Brown, George Douglas, 60; Mrs. M. McNeil, 30; Mrs. G. Allen.
Originating in the freight elevator shaft at the rear of the building, the flames quickly spread to the top floor and many tenants were trapped on third, fourth and fifth floors.
Soon the exits were completely cut off and heavy black smoke filled the hallway and rooms. Caught in a building not equipped with fire escapes the tenants were forced to the windows.

LOGGING DEALS SOUTHERN B.C.

TIMBER AT HARRISON LAKE AND AT COWICHAN LAKE SOLD FOR HUGE SUMS

VANCOUVER, April 16.—A. B. Crawford Logging Co. Ltd. has purchased from the Harrison Lake Timber Co. 750,000,000 feet of standing fir in the vicinity of Harrison Lake at a cost of approximately two million dollars, according to an announcement made Saturday. G. S. Morrison of Seattle is the secretary of the purchasing company.
Cutting rights on timber in Lot 75 Cowichan Lake estimated to contain between six and seven hundred million board feet, has been purchased by the McDonald-Murphy Logging Co. in conjunction with John Schroeder Lumber Co. of Milwaukee from the North American Timber Holding Company of Chicago. Approximately two million dollars is involved in the deal.
