

NAVIGABLE WATERS' PROTECTION ACT.

Ald. Oscar Larsen, also saying his farewells, stated that a good deal of pleasure had attended his three years' service in the council, and it was with some regret that he was relinquishing office. He thanked one and all of the aldermen for courtesies that had been extended him during his term of office and wished them all a bright and prosperous New Year. He also had kind words to say for the City Hall staff and the press.

Following the council meeting, Mayor Newton entertained the aldermen and press representatives informally.

EXTENSION OF THEATRE LOTS

Payment to City for Conversion of Lane Gives Aivazoffs Additional Ten Feet of Depth for Structure

As a result of a deal closed with the city council last night M. Y. and Paul Aivazoff will obtain an extra ten feet of depth for the new theatre they are building on Third Avenue near the corner of Fulton Street. This will give them a total ground space of fifty by 110 feet for the structure.

Thomas McLymont, a strip 10 feet by 100 feet on the south side of the lane in from Fulton Street and back of lots 6 and 7 where the theatre will be built and then exchange therefor 10 by 50 feet of the lane immediately back of lots 6 and 7, they (the Aivazoffs) to bear all the cost involved in the moving of the present reading room building off the new lane as well as removal of telephone poles and sewer alteration. Thus the city will be the direct gainer of \$400 cash and 10 by 50 feet of additional lane. Owners of lots bordering on the changed lane acceded to the proposition and City Solicitor E. F. Jones informed the council that the request could be met legally under the Municipal Act.

It was moved by Ald. Perry and Ald. Linsey, that the request be granted, a bylaw to the effect then being given its first reading so as to bind next year's council and enable the theatre builders to proceed with the work without delay.

In thanking the council for meeting with the request, M. Y. Aivazoff referred to the fact that the additional ten feet in depth thus secured would allow of considerable improvements in the theatre building such as up-to-date dressing rooms, mezzanine floor, etc. He further suggested that the city might be able, through negotiation with owners of other lots abutting on the same lane, to extend the property line of the entire block back the same ten feet, thus straightening out the lane again. It so happened that it was the only block in the city where this could be done, the city itself owning the half of the block on the south side of the lane.

CITY REPEATS ITS REQUESTS

Asking Again for Provision of Fishermen's Floats and Sale of Block 21, Section 1

On suggestion of Mayor Newton, the city council decided last night to reiterate a former request to the federal department of public works that floats for the protection of the local halibut fleet and other fishing vessels be immediately provided at Cow Bay, adjacent to block 21, section 1, the former court house site, be placed on the market without delay by the provincial government.

The original request in connection with the fishermen's floats was made by the city council on July 11 last. As the federal house would be reassembling on January 26, the mayor thought the time was opportune for the city to again make the request in order, at least, to strengthen the hands of the federal member in his demands along this line. The mayor's suggestion was implemented with a motion by Ald. Jos. Greer, Ald. G. P. Tinker seconding.

The request in connection with block 21, section 1, was moved by Alderman Stephens and seconded by Ald. Jos. Greer.

FAVORABLE REPORT ON SUPERANNUATION

City Council to Get Further Information as to Measure Sought by Fire Department

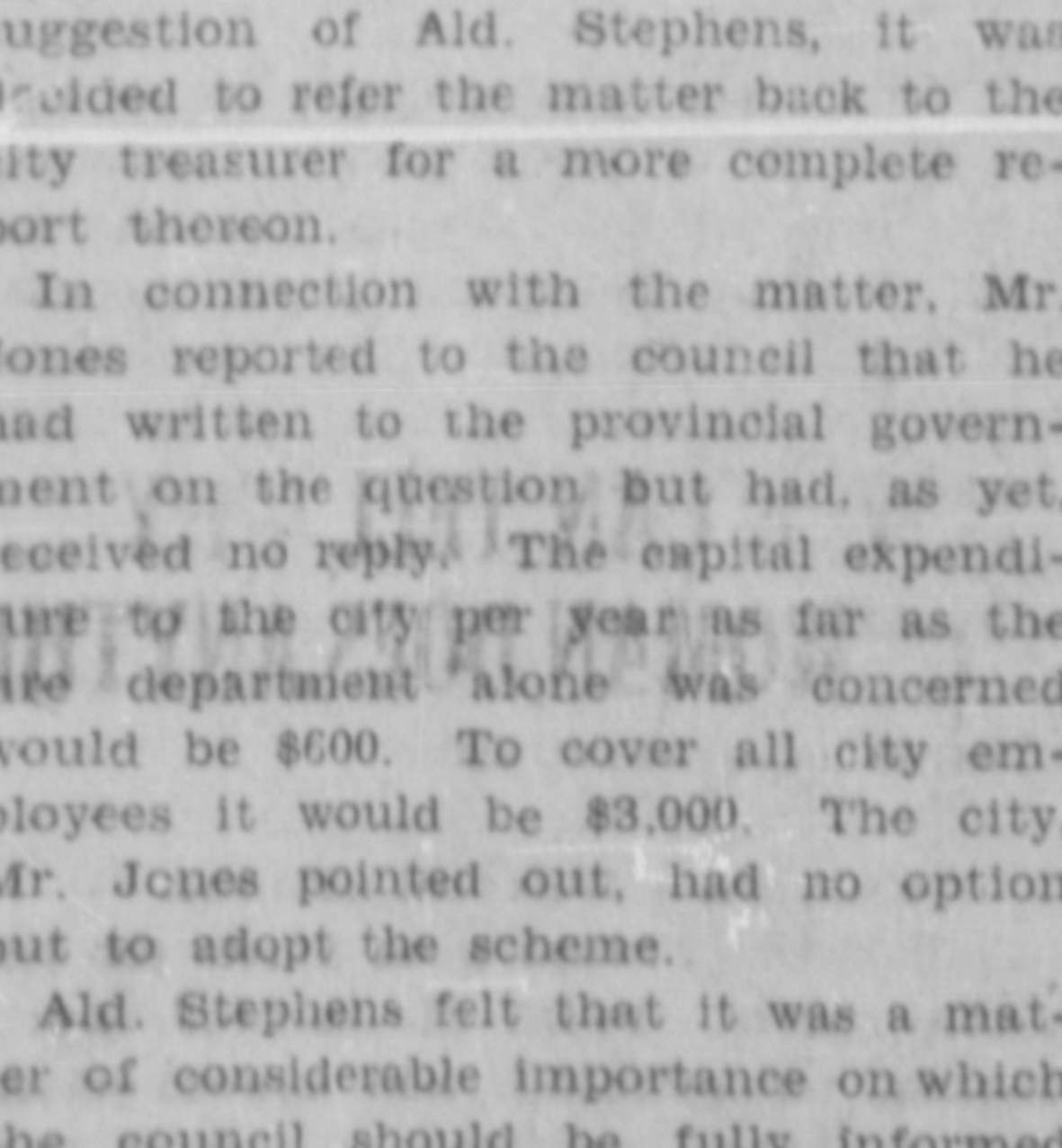
The finance committee reported favorably to the city council last night on meeting the request of the fire department for the institution of a scheme of superannuation subject to the provisions of the Superannuation Act but, on suggestion of Ald. Stephens, it was decided to refer the matter back to the city treasurer for a more complete report thereon.

In connection with the matter, Mr. Jones reported to the council that he had written to the provincial government on the question but had, as yet, received no reply. The capital expenditure to the city per year as far as the fire department alone was concerned would be \$600. To cover all city employees it would be \$3,000. The city, Mr. Jones pointed out, had no option but to adopt the scheme.

Ald. Stephens felt that it was a matter of considerable importance on which the council should be fully informed before finally adopting it. His suggestion that it go back to the city solicitor and city treasurer for more complete report was adopted.

HOCKEY TEAM FOR OLYMPICS

Varsity Grads Lost Only One Game in Their Allan Cup Series Last Year

TORONTO, Jan. 10.—The University of Toronto Graduates' Hockey team will sail for St. Moritz, Switzerland, in January to represent Canada in the Hockey division of the Olympic Games. Organized only at the beginning of last season the Grads won the Allan Cup, emblematic of the Amateur Hockey Championship of Canada, by a brilliant series of victories. Not until as champions of the East they met Port William, Western winners in the final playoff at Vancouver, did they encounter a single defeat. The Grads fought through five games before the collegians got the edge.

The Grads' first appearance was in the Sportsmen's Patriotic Association series in the fall of 1926. They were nosed out of winning this event by Marlboro, another Toronto club. Then with the opening of the Ontario Hockey Association series the team began to make itself felt and to attract attention by a consistent run of victories. By defeating Marlboro, Peterboro, Brantford, Toronto Canoe Club and North Toronto they won the right to meet Peterboro in the group playoffs. The Peto, who had already suffered a 10-1 defeat at the hands of the Grads, surprised the fans by holding the ex-collegians to a score of 1-1. In the second playoff game, however, the Grads came through, winning 2-0.

The team then entered the finals of the O.H.A. senior series, and met Kitchener. This team was beaten handily in two games and the Grads emerged senior champions of the O.H.A. by a score of 9-3 on the round.

They now had to meet the Intermediate O.H.A. champions, the Twelfth Battery of London, for the right to represent the association in the Allan Cup series. The military lads put up the toughest opposition the Grads had yet encountered, but were beaten largely owing to the brilliant play of Lou Hudson, Grad right wing.

St. Francis Nationals of Montreal, Quebec champions, held the Grads to a tie score of one all at their first meeting. The second game played in Toronto gave the ex-students a seven to one victory over the French-Canadian team. In this game Red Porter, dashing defence player, and Joe Sullivan, the goalie, were the outstanding players.

After beating the New Edinburgh team of Ottawa by scores of 10 to nothing and seven to one the Grads were entitled to meet Fort William in the Allan Cup final at Vancouver. The second game, in which Bert Plaxton starred, was scarcely over before the Grads were aboard a west-bound train after an enthusiastic send-off from Toronto fans.

The four games played at Vancouver against the Fort William team proved one of the hardest fought series in the annals of Canadian hockey. The brand of hockey displayed by both teams was in the estimation of many old-time fans who witnessed the games the finest ever shown on Canadian ice.

The first game was a tie, two all, the brilliant individual efforts of Dave Trotter, who scored both goals, going through the entire Fort William team for one of them to save the Toronto team from defeat.

In the second fixture the Grads met the first defeat, the Forts winning by a score of three to two. The third game, featured by the smart play of Porter, Hudson and Taylor, went to the Grads by a score of four to one, tying the series.

In the final game the ex-collegians won by the narrow margin of two to one. Ross Taylor had the distinction of scoring the winning goal on a pass from Delahay.

SPORT CHAT

Heavyweight title fights in the near future will draw crowds of possibly 200,000 persons, Gene Tunney, the present titleholder, told champions in the various major branches of sport at the "sport champions' dinner" given by the Madison Square Garden Athletic Club in New York. Tunney said he thought the "time was coming when title bouts in his own division would draw twice as much as they do now—in crowds." The last Tunney-Dempsey match was fought before nearly 150,000 persons.
