

ALL READY FOR BIG MARATHON

NEARLY THREE HUNDRED WILL START IN THIRD WIGLEY SWIMMING TOMORROW
TORONTO, Sept. 4—Each determined to emerge professional long distance champion of the world, nearly 300 marathon swimmers will take to the waters of Lake Ontario at 10 a.m. tomorrow in the third Wigley Marathon, conducted by the Canadian National Exhibition. About six o'clock tomorrow evening one of them will walk from the water to receive the acclaim of more than a hundred thousand spectators and first prize money of \$25,000. He or she for the five prize winners of the women's ten-mile race on August 29 will be in the race—will have completed the two and one half mile rectangular course six times in the 15 mile grind and withstood the cold of Lake Ontario for eight hours or more. Although the winner is expected to finish around six o'clock it may be many hours more before the last finisher is in. The first five to finish behind the victor share \$10,000 in prize money and it may well into the night before the battle for these places is finished.
