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GOOD PLAY IN TENNIS FINALS

CARL BRAND WINS MEN'S SINGLES LADIES' AND MIXED DOUBLES ALSO PLAYED

The finals of the city tennis championships on Saturday produced some of the finest tennis ever seen in Prince Rupert. In the men's singles, Carl Brand won over Poli Howard in five sets after a series of very keenly contested games. Scores were 3-6; 7-5; 6-1; 6-4. It was anybody's game till the last. Both players revealed an extensive repertoire of strokes with Brand's forearm drive to Howard's backhand being a frequent winner. Howard rarely got in his first serve and this was the weakest part of his game but most of the points were won only after hard fought rallies brimful of baseline drives and close volleying at the net. There should have been a much larger gallery to see the contest. Both players are to be congratulated on their excellent play. In the ladies' doubles Mrs. McMordie and Mrs. Shadwell were too strong for Miss Davies and Miss Vera Smith and won in straight sets 6-4; 6-1. The greater experience of the winners with Mrs. McMordie's steadiness and Mrs. Shadwell's fast court work and net play was the deciding factor. Miss Davies and Miss Smith would do much better if they had more confidence as they have a big variety of shots. They put up a splendid game all through and are to be congratulated on their plucky fight. The mixed doubles were won by Mrs. Shadwell and Carl Brand against Miss Smith and Poli Howard. All players were somewhat weary after their previous games and this told. Scores were 6-4; 6-2. The pleasing feature of this series was undoubtedly the way in which Miss Smith repeatedly returned Brand's first service and at times volleyed splendidly. Mrs. Shadwell at the net was effective. Both Brand and Howard were good but obviously weary.

FINAL GRAIN VESSEL HERE

ANGLO-PERUVIAN ARRIVES FROM ENGLAND AND WILL LOAD FOR U. K. AND CONTINENT

The British freighter Anglo-Peruvian Prince Rupert's final grain ship of the season, arrived in port at 6 o'clock last evening from North Shields, England, and immediately took up her berth at the Alberta Wheat Pool's elevator where she will load a full cargo for the United Kingdom or Continent, clearing out practically all the grain left in the local plant. Drying of holds and other preparatory work is going on today and it is expected to start loading the ship tomorrow morning. She will probably be ready to sail by Saturday. The Anglo-Peruvian left North Shields on June 12. Captain John W. Eno is in command and there is a crew of 39 men. Of 425 feet in length, 58 ft beam and 28 ft deep, the Anglo-Peruvian is already mostly lined. She is of 3,331 ton register and is owned by the Nitrate Producers Company Ltd. of London, England.

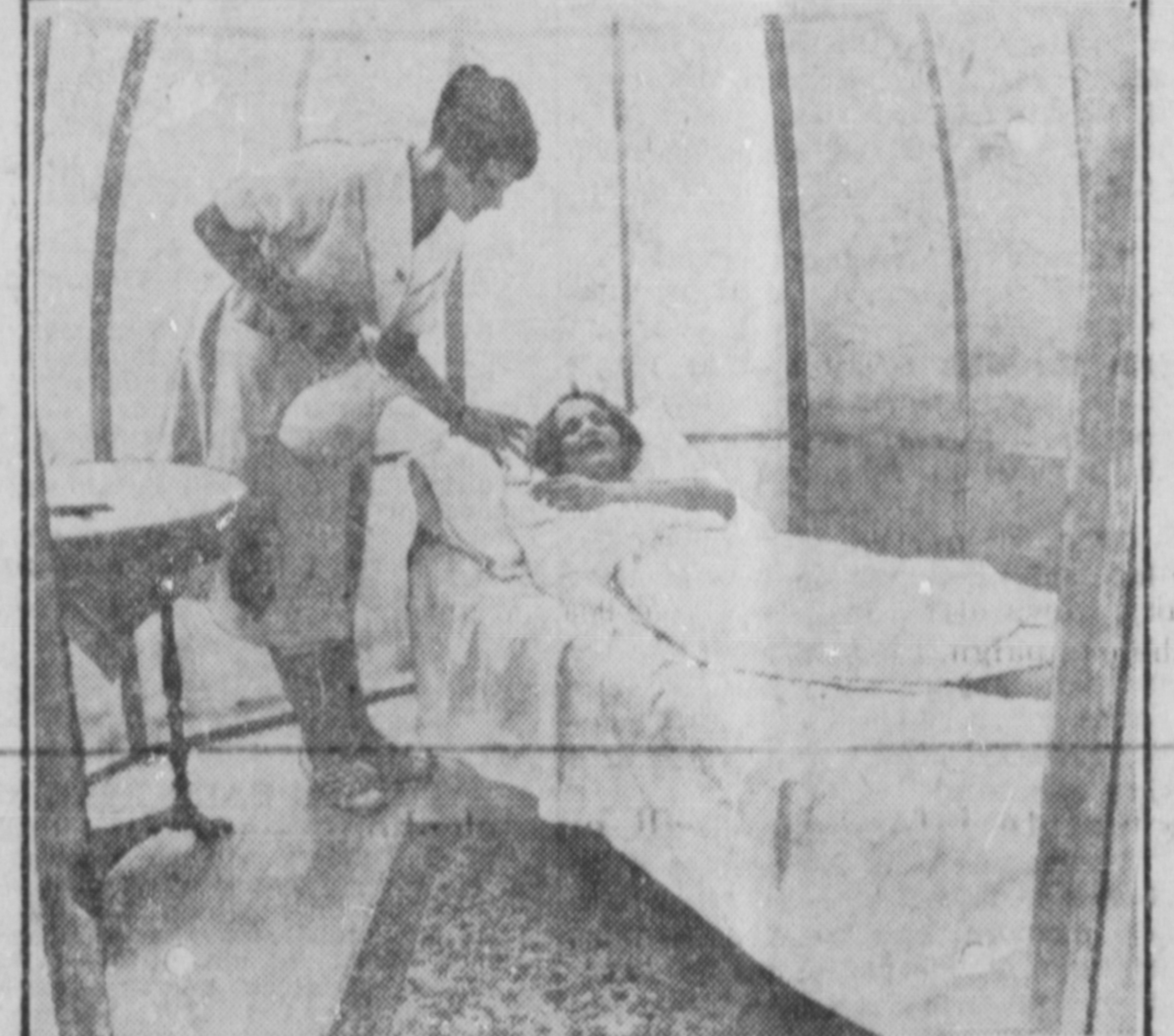

SPORT CHAT

The wholesale suspension of 400 players and officials alike in amateur association football in the north-eastern area in England calls to mind the case of some of our younger athletes in Prince Rupert. The payment of money prizes for participation in any form of sport professionalizes a boy. That is the central fact. In isolated places like Prince Rupert this may not seem of any importance but what happens when this boy grows up and takes part in sport in some other centre where the rules are adhered to? And what will happen if some of our present or future athletes qualify to represent their country in Olympic Games? This would be the greatest possible honor that could come to any individual in the sport world. But this honor is only for those who are amateurs. The law in connection with amateur football in England is as follows:-An Amateur Player may have paid for him or have refunded to him: (a) Railway, motor, tram, boat, etc., fares, or other necessary expenses, actually incurred by him in travelling from and to his home or work for the purpose of playing in a match. (b) Hotel expenses, i.e. necessary meals during the day and
