

EX-GOVERNOR OF ALBERTA

RANCH NEAR PEACHLAND AT AGE OF 69 YEARS

PEACHLAND, July 23 .- Hon George Hedley Vicars Bulyea, B.A., L.L.D., former lieutenant governor of Alberta, died at his ranch near here on Sunday. He was born at Gagetown, New Brunswick, in 1859 and, after being educated in New Brunswick and engaging in teaching for a short time, he went to Winnigeg in 1682, soon moving to Qu' Appelle, Sask, where he went into business. He took an active part in politics of the North West Territores before they became provinces and was appointed the first lieutenant governor of Alberta in 1905, serving a second term after 1910. He came here from Edmonton several years ago to retire.
