PARKING BYLAW IS PUT THROUGH

MUCH DELAYED MEASURE FINALLY DEALT WITH BY CITY COUNCIL LAST NIGHT

With certain revisions, the amended Street Traffic Bylaw, which has been hanging fire since last fall, being held over from time to time for various reasons, was finally given its committee readings last night and at the next meeting will be finally reconsidered and adopted. To aid the council in its deliberations on the matter, Sergeant J. P. M. Hannah, chief of the city detachment of the provincial police, was present as well as representatives of the taxi interests in the persons of E. J. Large and Tom Dybhavn.

The clause that cars shall not be allowed to park between one half hour after sunset and one half hour before sunrise without a red light visible for a distance of at least fifty feet proved acceptable and was passed as it stood.

The bylaw was amended, with the chief of police and the two taxi men agreeing, to provide that on streets of less than twenty feet width parking shall be allowed on only one side of the street. The parking side on the streets shall be the east and on Avenues, the north, and the cars shall be facing in the proper direction for the side of the street. The bylaw originally read that cars could park on both sides of all streets. Numerous cases of where congestion might arise with such a system were pointed out and the amendment was finally made on motion of Ald. Prudhomme.

It was also decided that no parking should be allowed at intersections within twenty-five feet of the building line instead of ten feet as originally provided. The corner of Third Avenue and Sixth Street was cited as a point where there would be congestion and possible danger to pedestrians if cars were allowed to park ten feet from the building line.

Another amendment was that the restriction as to the distance that cars might be parked from a fire be reduced from 1500 to 600 feet.

The region on Third Avenue in which cars must be parked at least six feet apart in order to allow free access and egress was increased from Fifth Street to Seventh Street to McBride Street to Ninth Street after considerable bickering.

Ald. Rudderham inquired as to the legality of cars being parked on public turntables in the streets and was told that this was not permitted.

The question of cars parking at the turn in the Cow Bay road to the government wharf was brought up by Ald. Collart who felt that something should be done to relieve congestion there.

Tom Dybhavn suggested that it might aid the police if "no parking" signs were obtained and placed in front of such buildings as theatres and dance halls.

In the matter of giving right of way to the fire department, police cars and ambulances, Mr. Large inquired as to how the police car was going to be recognized. The city solicitor stated that, if it had no distinguishing mark, it was not necessary to give it the right of way.

The bylaw was given its first and second readings and reported complete.

NO SECONDER SEWER MOTION

ALDERMAN PRUDHOMME'S SUGGESTION THAT WORK BE COMPLETED NOT SUPPORTED

CRITICISM OF WORK

CONTRACT SYSTEM IS NOT IN FAVOR WITH ALDERMAN WHO, HOWEVER, GIVES WAY

Ald. A. J. Prudhomme's resolution asking for calling of tenders for the completion of the trunk sewer system and the paving of Borden Street failed at last night's council meeting for want of a seconder. There was an ominous silence after the resolution had been read by the clerk. Ald. Prudhomme attempted to speak to the resolution but was informed that he could not do so until it had been seconded. After waiting a few minutes, the mayor called for the clerk to pass on to the next item of business.

The next item of business happened to be a bylaw providing for the construction of a fifteen foot pavement along Borden Street under the local improvement plan.

Immediately after the bylaw was announced but before it had been read, Ald. Prudhomme rose to his feet and announced that he would like to object to the bylaw being passed at the present time. He felt that it was a mistake to proceed with further public works until such time as conditions were brought about in the board of works where a dollar's value could be obtained for every dollar that was spent.

The mayor felt that Ald. Prudhomme's objection was not in accordance with the subject matter of the bylaw.

Ald. Greer, chairman of the board of works, explained that it was desirable to get the work under way during the fine weather of summer.

The city solicitor gave his opinion that, if Ald. Prudhomme objected, the council had no power to suspend the rules and go into committee to consider the bylaw. It could be taken no further than the first reading.

Ald. Prudhomme went on to state that he was not in favor of the contract system for he felt that the work could be done more cheaply by the city itself if there was efficiency and economy. The council had no right to spend the public money if there was not such efficiency and economy.

Ald. Prudhomme apparently waived further objections for the bylaw was taken on into the committee stage and finally reported complete. It will come up again at next council meeting for final adoption, Ald. Prudhomme being informed that he would then have another opportunity of voicing his objections.

The boat will leave at 9 a.m. and return at 9 p.m. All proceeds will go to the funds of the club.
