Boom in Mining In Northern B. C.

The directors of the Dolly Varden Mines, Ltd., all went north yesterday to examine the mine and the railroad leading to it. Work on the mine has already commenced and within a very short time the first shipment will be made.

Sir Donald Mann is at present visiting the Big Missouri mine which his company has under bond from the owners. There is an immense lot of ore in sight at that mine and if the depth proves all right the option will be taken up and the mine worked next year. In the meantime exploratory work is proceeding.

At the now famous Premier Mine, formerly known as the Bush Mine, work is proceeding and preparations are being made for large shipments to be made next winter. The ore in this mine is known to be very rich and there is any quantity of it.

Many prospectors are in the hills back of Stewart and Alice Arm and in both districts many properties have been bonded for large sums. The result is that mining is booming in the north this year. The strike caused somewhat of a setback owing to the difficulty of getting in supplies, but now everything is speeding up. This will be the biggest mining year northern British Columbia has seen for some years and it is simply laying the foundation for future work of a much more extensive nature.

Lecture Was Much Too Expensive.

Just why there is any group of men and women willing to finance E. T. Kingsley to go around the country and lecture, is one of the problems no one can solve. His story told last night was childish in the extreme. He attempted to show how socialism could be brought about and he failed utterly. He was here a week putting up at the Prince Rupert Hotel and he certainly was not worth the money. He may not have been a member of the master class, but he certainly was not worth his board. His first lecture was interesting, but his second was simply tiresome. It must have cost the Socialists and their friends several hundred dollars to stage the two lectures, but it was just another example of some of the luxuries of life being much too expensive.

Both Sides Distort Truth.

The anti-Bolsheviks often distort the truth in order to make it out that the Bolsheviks in Russia are even worse than the former rulers ever were. The pro-Bolsheviks are equally keen on distorting things to prove that everything is lovely in that country and that government under a working class soviet is as near perfect as possible. Take the half way between these and something like the real truth is arrived at.

Lenin and Trotsky are rulers in every sense of the word and under them controlling the destinies of the country is a new ruling class and a very ignorant one. They are human and for that reason have all the prejudices and passions possessed by others. Some of them being ignorant have the prejudices much stronger than the former rulers, for ignorance breeds prejudice. Being fond of power they are using every possible means of holding to it. They will be no passing the buck. Lenin thinks he has a life job and will hold on to it, if he possibly can.

LAND REGISTRY ACT

(Sections 36 and 134.)

Re Application No. 10,577-1. File 6091. TAKE NOTICE that application has been made to register Robert Henry Smith of Prince Rupert, B. "and in default of a caveat or certificate of its pendency being filed before the registration as owner of the person entitled under such tax sale, all persons so served with notice, or under them, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by virtue of any unregistered instrument, and all persons claiming any interest in the land by descent whose title is not registered under the provisions of this Act, shall be for ever estopped and debarred from setting up any claim to or in respect of the land so sold for taxes, and the Registrar shall register the person entitled under such tax sale as owner of the land so sold for taxes."

AND WHEREAS application has been made for a Certificate of Indefeasible Title to the above-mentioned lands, in the name of Robert Henry Smith.

AND WHEREAS on investigating the title it appears that prior to the 10th day of December, 1917 (the date on which the said lands were sold for overdue taxes), you were the registered and assessed owner thereof.

WATER NOTICE DIVERSION AND USE.
