Halibut fishing begins Wednesday and already the larger boats are away to the banks. It is a hazardous and strenuous occupation but those who have once engaged in it feel loath to give it up. It has in it all the elements of sport for sometimes the catch is large and sometimes small and as the boats all now operate on the share! system the fishermen lose money or make it according to the fortune that is theirs.

It is to be hoped that conditions will be such this year that the fishermen will do well, for they are the people who bring the money into the city.

All promoters that discuss this matter include Prince Rupert in their plans, and there are a number of plans being evolved many of which will die aborning.


