CORPORATION OF THE CITY OF PRINCE RUPERT

TAKE NOTICE THAT:

1. The Council of the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert intends to construct a concrete sidewalk seventeen feet wide on the south side of Second Avenue commencing at a point ten feet east of the westerly boundary of Fourth Street and extending along the south side of Second Avenue to a point seventeen feet west of the east boundary of Seventh Street, excepting therefrom the intersection of 6th Street and the concrete walks already built and abutting on Lots 9, 10, 11 and 12, Block 23, Section 1, as a local improvement and intends to specially assess the cost upon the land abutting directly on the work, except such portion of the cost as is incurred at street intersections.

2. The estimated cost of the work is \$3,298.50, of which \$211.50 is to be paid by the Corporation and the estimated annual special rate per foot frontage is \$3.841. The special assessment is to be paid in 20 annual instalments.

3. Persons desiring to petition against undertaking the work must do so on or before the 28th day of September, 1928.

It, although so far, his catch has been light. He is accompanied by Peter Newell, a Seattle boat-builder, who built the boat, the "K-900" in which the two are travelling, which is equipped with a Fordson engine. They are seeing the country in a leisurely fashion and have taken over a month for the trip so far, coming to Juneau from Cape Oatney. "There are about about 500 boats there, and they are catching a number of fish, mostly cohoes, I am told," Mr. Nichols said. "Personally I wouldn't know a king from a coho if I had one on my hook," he added modestly. From Juneau they plan to go to Icy Straits and gradually work their way south from there, to arrive in Seattle by September 1.

After a brief falling behind, halibut landings at the port of Prince Rupert for the 1928 season are now close on the heels of the total for the 1927 season at a similar date. The total for the present season up to yesterday stood at 17,845,800 pounds, made up of 12,169,400 pounds American and 5,676,400 pounds Canadian.
