**SPRING SERVICE STARTING SOON**

Prince Rupert Will Get Two C.N.R. Boats a Week From Vancouver in March

Spring schedule of Canadian National Coast Steamships, providing two sailings a week between here and Vancouver, will go into effect with the sailing from Vancouver on the night of March 26 by the steamer Prince Rupert according to announcement made this morning by R. F. McNaughton, C.N.R. district passenger agent.

The service will be carried out by the steamers Prince Rupert and Prince George and sailings will be from Vancouver Monday and Thursday nights at 8 o'clock, arriving here Wednesday and Saturday mornings at 10.30. The Wednesday boat from the south will sail at 4 p.m. for Ketchikan and Anyox, returning here at 8 p.m. Thursday evenings and sailing for the south at 11 p.m. The Saturday boat will sail at 10 p.m. for Stewart, returning here at 8 p.m. and sailing south at 11 p.m. Sundays.

This service will be effective from March 26 until June 9 when the three-boats-a-week summer schedule will be reverted to, providing weekly sailings to Skagway.

The Queen Charlotte Island service will remain unchanged for the present.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Beatrice, Capt. Robert Thomson, is due at 6 o'clock tomorrow morning from Vancouver and wayports and will sail at 11 a.m. on her return south.

**NORWEGIAN DIES HERE**

Rasmus Petersen Succumbs in Prince Rupert General Hospital—Survived by Widow and Three Children

The death occurred at midnight last night in the Prince Rupert General Hospital of Rasmus Petersen, aged 49, who had been a patient in the institution since Christmas. Deceased sustained a fractured leg when he slipped on the icy streets but the direct cause of death was Bright's disease.

Born in Stavanger, Norway, the late Mr. Petersen was married in 1899 and the following year came to Canada and took up a homestead in Alberta. Later Mr. Petersen moved with his wife and family of five children—Ann, Marguerite, Thor, Peter and Krien—all of whom are now grown-up, to South Dakota where his health failed him but where he remained for nine years. After returning to Alberta, two years ago deceased came to Prince Rupert and has been in the employ of the city. The widow, stricken with grief, is sick in bed today.

The funeral will take place Monday afternoon under the auspices of the Moose Lodge with Rev. John H. Hansen, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, officiating. The B.C. Undertakers have charge of burial arrangements.
