### THE NEW COUNCIL

The aldermen, who, together with the mayor, make up the city council, are a fairly representative group this year and should make an excellent legislative and executive body for the city. The two defeated mayoralty candidates will be a loss to the council as will also former Alderman Perry. However, the new men will undoubtedly rise to the occasion and show that they have the ability to hold the positions. Alderman Collart is not at all new to the job, so he will have the advantage over the others.

### WRITING A SLOGAN

Slogans are again being invited for advertising the city, it being thought that possibly something better may yet be obtained. It might be in order to point out that most of those submitted on a former occasion were not really slogans but rather sub-titles. However, it is to be assumed that either slogans or sub-titles will be accepted. To illustrate what is meant by a slogan there is "Follow the Birds to Victoria," or "Watch Tacoma Grow" which are used extensively by the cities they advertise. They indicate action. The sub-title is seen in such an expression as "Prince Rupert, Prince of all Princes."

### DOMINION LIKELY TO ACT

It seems as if the Dominion Government is likely to deal with the Peace River problem and provide an outlet to the country, the route to be determined by competent engineers. That is the only satisfactory outcome. For Prince Rupert or Stewart, or Prince George or Vancouver to dictate where the line shall go would be monstrous, unless they were prepared to pay the bill. All we can do is lay before the government all the data possible and then put it up to them. There is a committee now working on that and doubtless it will soon be prepared to say what they have done. If they do not act soon it may be too late.

### BARKIS IS WILLIN'

An American newspaper cannot be read intelligibly without a knowledge of Dickens. That fact was brought forcefully to mind by noting an editorial article headed "Mellon not a Barkis." The idea was that Mellon was not willing to be a candidate. The striking part about the whole thing was that without having read the story of the courtship of Peggotty by Mr. Barkis it would be difficult to understand the drift of the article. A knowledge of Dickens is still considered part of the education of the ordinary intelligent person, at least on the American side of the line.

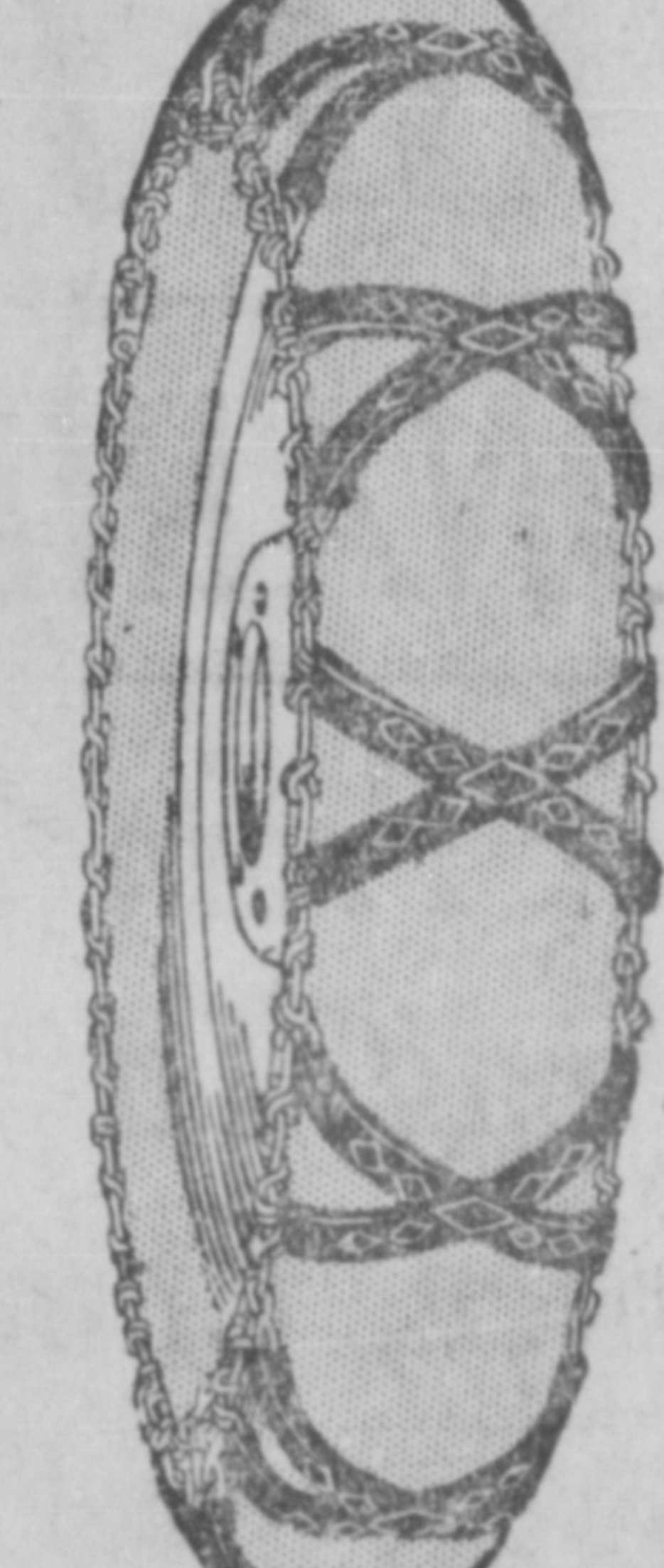

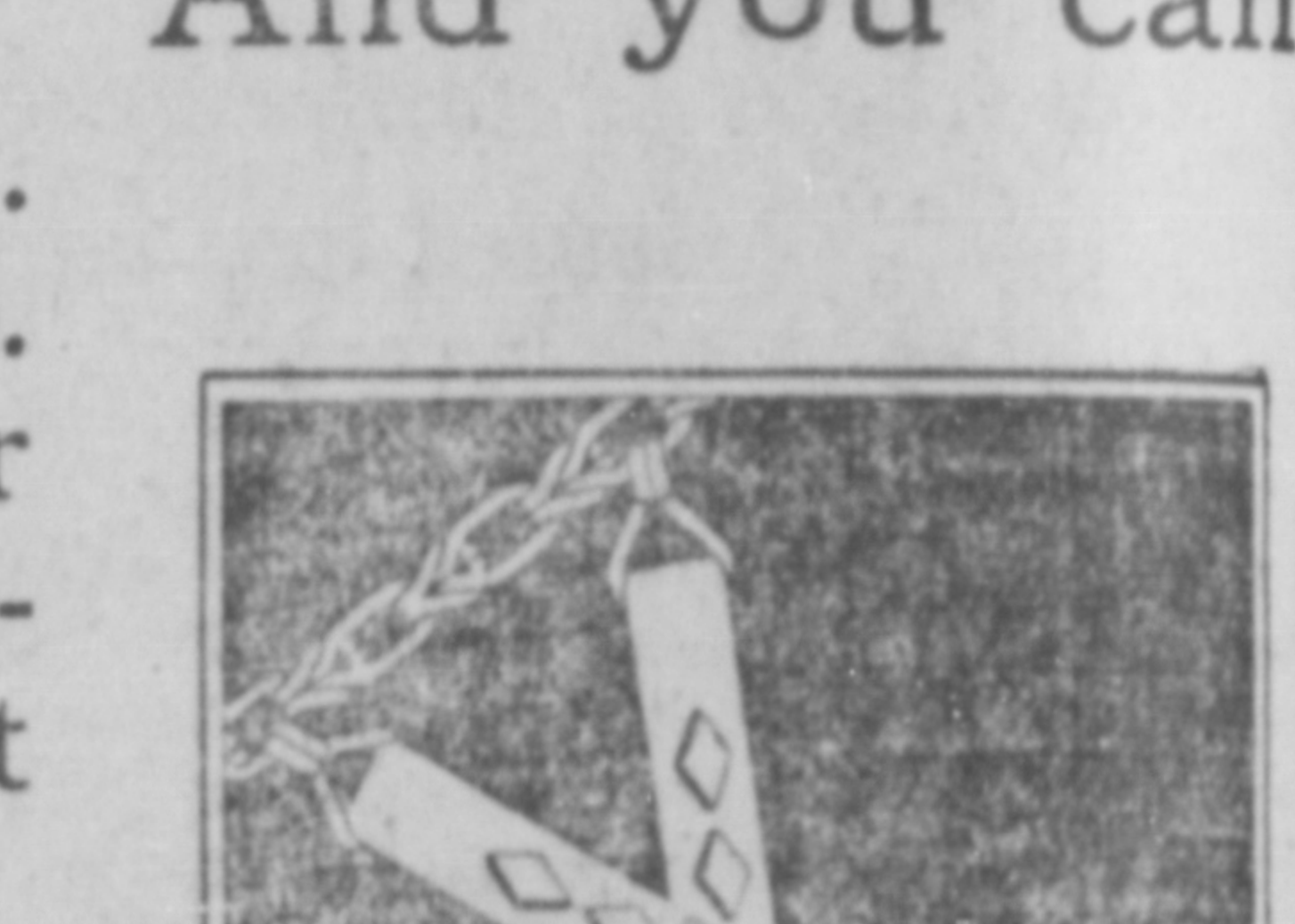
