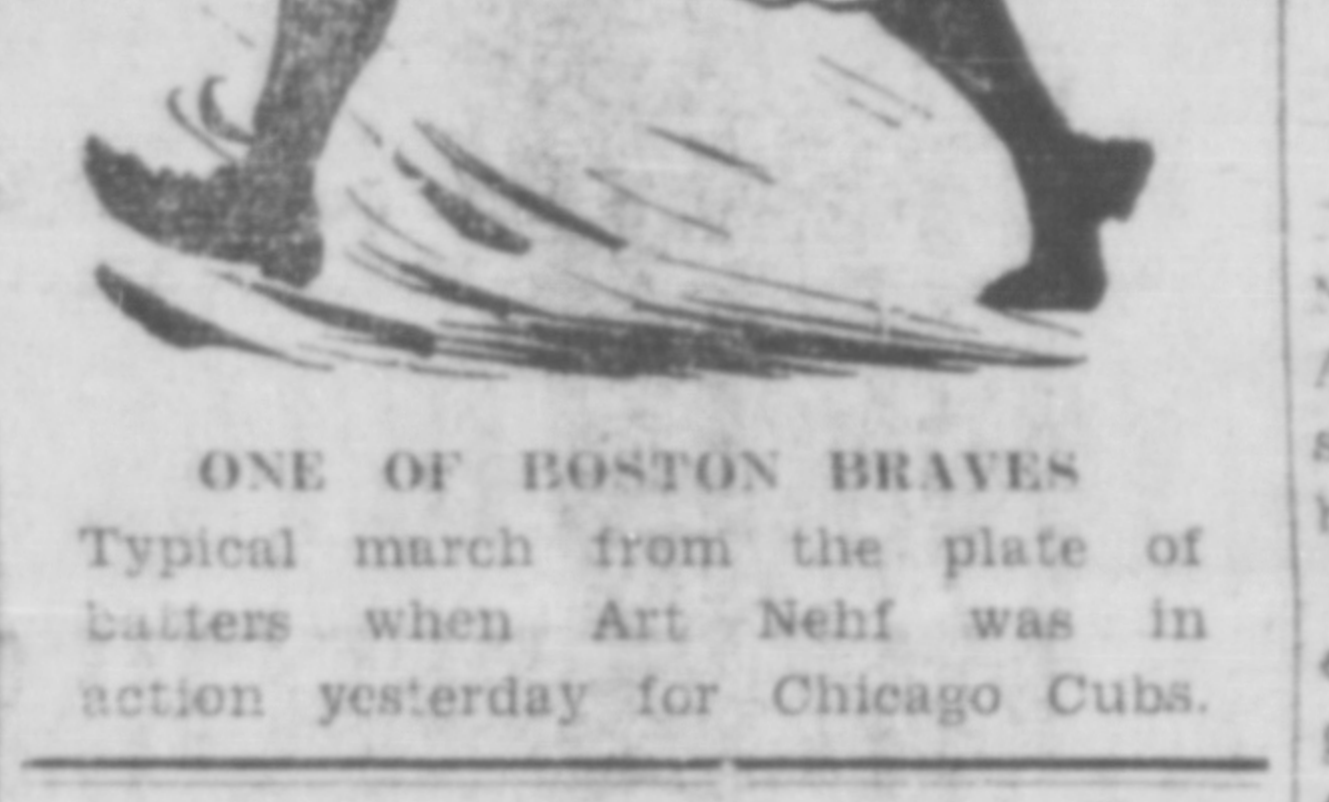

**FAMOUS CRICKETER VISITING ENGLAND**

**Says Australians Short of Fast Bowlers Just Now**

LONDON, May 19.—C. G. Macartney, the famous Australian cricketer, has arrived in London with an Irish wife, but he has no intention of playing cricket. "Although I shall be here until September," he informed a reporter "I don't think I shall play a single game. And I'm not hurrying back to Australia for the season. I have retired."

"At what age does a cricketer's life end?" asked the reporter.  
"Some can manage 40, others reach 45 before they get too old," Macartney replied. "The world is short of fast bowlers at the moment," he said. "In Australia they are always on the look out for new blood, but I can't tell what material they'll have for the next test."

Macartney said that his visit was entirely for sight-seeing—to show his wife the Old Country. "She went to Australia when she was very young," he explained. "She is a native of Belfast."

**SCORE 109 TO 0 MADE IN ATLANTIC**

ATLANTIC, Ia., May 19. — If Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and their slugging New York Yankees mates ever come to Atlantic, they will have a difficult time showing the natives anything new in baseball.

The reason is that nearly everything except an extra inning and errorless game happened when Atlantic best Griswold, 109 to 0, in a high school game recently.

While their pitcher, Don King, hurled a no hit, no run game struck out 16 and got 15 hits in 17 times at bat, this is what the Atlantic boys, second stringers, too, did to Griswold's only pitcher, Gustin:  
They made 92 hits in 139 attempts.  
They hit 16 home runs, six triples and 24 doubles.  
They scored in every inning, getting 30 in the second and 27 in the seventh. One of them made five home runs and another scored 14 times in 14 times at bat.  
The game stopped at the end of the eighth inning when the score keeper became exhausted.
