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Anarchist Plot Exposed at Rome and Leaders Arrested; Try to Tamper with Garrison

Italian Cabinet Decides to Deal Vigorously with the Cost of Living; Profiteers and Hoarders to be Dealt with by Hundreds and Experts to Distribute Food.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Rome, July 8.—An anarchist plot to attack the central part of Rome by means of hand grenades and other explosives was exposed by the arrest of 16 conspirators four hours before the time set for carrying out the plans.
About the same time thirty anarchists motored to Fort Pratallata, four miles from Rome and tried to induce the garrison to join in the attack. In the market place soldiers fired on the anarchists and seized several.
The city remains tranquil. Following a cabinet meeting it was announced that there would be a determined and vigorous policy designed to influence immediately the cost of living. Profiteers and hoarders, it was said, would be dealt with by hundreds.
The Government will supervise directly the regulation of prices and the distribution of the necessaries of life. It is also decided to increase importations from abroad. A national association composed of experts will be formed to carry on distribution under the government.

GAMBLING CASE AGAIN BEFORE CITY COUNCIL

Police Commissioners Asked to Make Recommendation for or Against Cancellation of License.

The City Council spent over half an hour last night discussing whether they should recommend to the attorney-general the cancellation of the license of D. Zarelli for the private club on Sixth St. following a conviction for gambling some time ago.
The matter was brought up on motion of Alderman Perry, seconded by Alderman Kirkpatrick, but after a long discussion the motion to ask for cancellation was withdrawn and on the motion of Alderman McMeekin seconded by Alderman Perry it was decided to refer the matter back to the Police Commissioners for recommendation, the opinion being expressed that it was desirable the mayor should take a stand on it one way or the other as the other members of the commission were divided.
The old argument for and against were given, one group taking the stand that to cancel the license would be discrimination as other clubs, it was admitted, were doing the same thing as Zarelli's; the other arguing that to omit cancelling this license would be discrimination against Fotos who lost his license for a somewhat similar offense.
The general consensus of opinion of the council seemed to be against making the recommendation for cancellation.

BOLSHEVIKI EXECUTE MANY INHABITANTS

Paris, July 8.—A dispatch from Constantinople to the Agence Dadio reported today that the Bolshevik forces had recaptured Tashkent, the capital of Russian Turkestan, executing 6,000 inhabitants.
The brother of Alexander Kerensky, former Russian premier, was among those executed, it is said.

SELL LOTS FOR CASH

Returned Soldiers Will Be Able to Purchase by Private Arrangement, But Others by Auction.

On the advice of the solicitors, Williams & Manson, the City Council last night decided to sell the city lots in Section 2 for cash only. A bylaw was put through authorizing the sale by public auction or by private treaty, it being understood that any sale by private treaty would be to returned soldiers only and then only in cases where they were prepared to build houses.
Already there are applications in from several returned men.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE DEVOTED TO TREATY

Aboard U. S. S. Georgia via Washington, D. C., July 8.—The President's message to be delivered to Congress on Thursday has been completed and will take about twenty minutes to read. It contains about 5,000 words devoted to the peace treaty, and protocols and the work of the peace conference.

LLOYD GEORGE COMPLIMENTS THE DELEGATES

Mentions in House of Commons the Work of Men From the Dominions, Especially General Botha.

London, July 7.—Premier Lloyd George, during the course of a speech in the House of Commons, paid a tribute to the assistance of representatives of the Dominions in connection with the peace treaty delegation.
The premier mentioned amid cheers the name of General Botha who participated on some most difficult commissions for adjusting extraordinarily delicate, complex, ethical and economic questions which had arisen.
"We owe a great deal to the ability and judgment with which they helped on innumerable commissions and their work has been the admiration of the foreign delegations," said the little Welshman.

OFFERS SELF IN PLACE OF FORMER KAISER

Field Marshal Von Hindenburg Appeals to Foch to Prevent Extradition.

Paris, July 8.—Field Marshal von Hindenburg has written Marshal Foch appealing for his support to prevent the extradition of the former German Emperor Wilhelm. Von Hindenburg offers to place his own person "fully and absolutely at the disposal of the Allied powers."
London, July 8.—Field Marshal von Hindenburg may be brought to London to testify in defense of the former Kaiser. It is also said that a number of U-boat captains and slayers of Edith Cavell and Capt. Fryatt expect to be at the Tower of London in a few days.

FORCES GIVEN PUBLIC THANKS OF PARLIAMENT

Resolution Moved By Premier and Seconded By Leader of Opposition.

Ottawa, July 8.—Parliament prorogued at 3:30 yesterday afternoon. There were the old time formalities, the customary triple knocks on the doors of the House, the summons to the chamber of the Honorable Senate and the formal closing of the session there by the Government.

The last few hours were occupied chiefly in expressing gratitude of the House to the Canadian military and naval forces for the unflinching steadfastness and skill with which during the war they had served the cause of the country and empire in circumstances of unexampled hardship and for the splendid contribution to the final victory of right and liberty.

The resolution was moved by the Prime Minister, seconded by the leader of the opposition and carried unanimously.

GENERAL KOLCHAK GAINING GROUND

Bolsheviki Showing Fatigue While Troops of All-Russian Government are Coming in.

Paris, July 7.—Reports from Omsk received here indicate an improvement in the situation of Admiral Kolchak, head of the All-Russian Government, while the Bolsheviks are showing fatigue and are weakened by transfers of troops to other fronts.
Admiral Kolchak is receiving reinforcements while the new recruits mobilized during the spring are rapidly getting into condition for service.

FREIGHT WRECK ON CANADIAN NATIONAL

Two Dead, One Seriously Injured As Result of Accident on Railway.

Edmonton, July 8.—As a result of a freight wreck on the Canadian National Railway at 11:30 o'clock Sunday night two miles west of Owenoway, two men are dead, one seriously, but not fatally wounded, and the engine and twelve freight cars are reduced to junk.
The dead are Norman E. Horner, brakeman, and W. Young, engineer. W. L. Givens, the fireman, was injured.

FIUME SCENE OF TROUBLE

Clashes Between Italian and French Soldiers in Which Several are Killed.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
Rome, July 8.—Clashes between French and Italians are reported at Fiume in advices from that city. The casualties number six killed and twenty injured.
According to despatches to Giornale Italia serious accidents have occurred within the last day or two at Fiume. Two French soldiers are reported to have insulted Italian grenadiers who remonstrated. The French fired on the grenadiers and then fled to the barracks from which they fired into the crowds that gathered.

LOCAL NEWS ITEMS

The Princess Mary of the C. P. R. coast service is expected to arrive in port on Thursday on her way to Ketchikan, Juneau and Skagway and will continue her regular tourist trips throughout the rest of the season.
G. A. Bryant and A. W. Cameron returned from Khatada lake yesterday afternoon. They report having fine sport, bringing home between seventy and eighty pounds of fish, the rainbows averaging from two to seven pounds.

The Prince George is expected on time tomorrow morning from the south and is carrying passengers, mails and freight for this port. Proceeding to Anyox tomorrow night she will leave for Vancouver on Thursday at midnight.

Joe Ratchford is still serving with the forces, having become attached to the headquarters staff and consequently does not expect to get home very soon. His company has to stay there in order to see all the others safely through England.

The Grand Trunk boat Prince John is expected from the south via the southern ports of Queen Charlotte Islands at any time today. She will leave for Buckley Bay, Massett and Port Clements tomorrow and will return to make a trip to Stewart on Saturday.

The scowload of shingles which has been lying at the Grand Trunk dock for some time was discharged into cars for shipment across the continent yesterday. During the absence of the freight handlers the barge was tied up here awaiting the return of the workers. The tug Francis Cutting has arrived with another scow and will return with both when they are unloaded.

Norris Pringle of this city has returned to Canada, but will remain in the east for a short time before coming out to his home in Prince Rupert. Morris as a boy joined up in the early days of the fighting and his many friends will be glad to hear of his safe return to Canada.

In the last freight train to arrive here there was a fine new motor truck for the Imperial Oil Company in one of the cars. It is made by the International Harvester Co., of Chicago, and will be a decidedly fine addition to the fleet of automobiles in the city. A novelty in the machine is that the speedometer is already rigged up on the hub of the front wheel and can be read from the side as the dial appears on the end of the axle.

DIRIGIBLE R-34 DUE TO START EARLY MORNING

Plan to Get Away at Five This Morning Was Abandoned; Weather Adverse.

Mineola, N. Y., July 8.—The British dirigible R-34 which was scheduled to start on the return trip to England, will not leave until some time between midnight Tuesday and 8 o'clock Wednesday morning, it was announced last night by Brigadier General E. M. Maitland, chief of the lighter than air craft of the British Air Ministry.

The proposed plan to get the gigantic airship away at 5 a.m. on Tuesday was abandoned last night because of local weather conditions including adverse and bumpy winds.
It is supposed that the dirigible crew will overhaul the engines during the afternoon. Without overhauling it would be inviting accident for the airship to take off on the venture, as quantities of carbon accumulated in the engines which were burning 108 hours while the craft was aloft on the unprecedented journey, which ended at Roosevelt Field on Sunday morning.

BAN PLACED ON SINN FEINERS

Proclamation From Dublin Castle Declaring Organizations in Tipperary Unlawful.

Dublin, July 8.—A proclamation has been issued from Dublin Castle declaring all Sinn Fein organizations and Irish Volunteers in the country of Tipperary unlawful associations.
The announcement was made in a memorandum by the Chief Secretary for Ireland enumerating the serious crimes and offences against these organizations during the past year.

NO REPRESENTATIONS REGARDING FORMER EMPEROR OF GERMANY

London, July 8.—Andrew Bonar Law, spokesman for the British Government, announced in the House of Commons today that no formal representations had yet been made to Holland with regard to the extradition of the former German Kaiser. He added, however, that steps were being taken in that direction.
