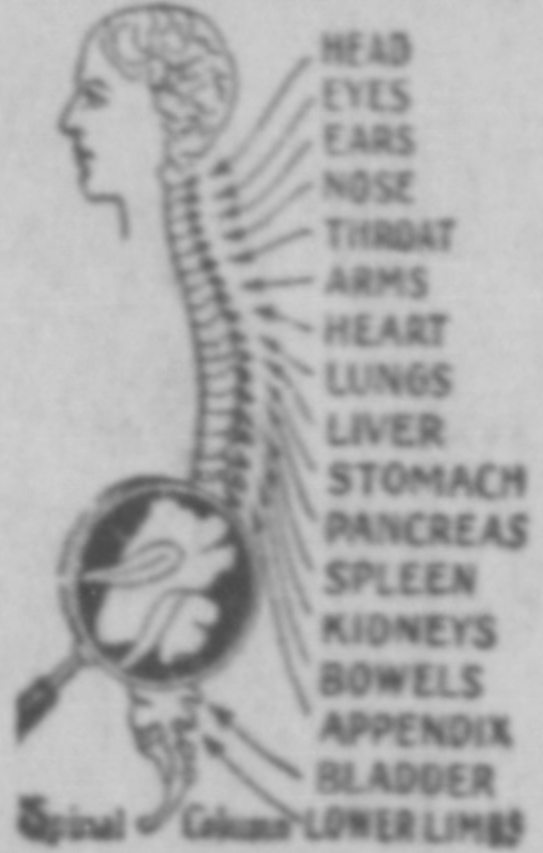

ROWDY SCENE IN A CHURCH

CONGREGATION REFUSES TO ALLOW SACRAMENTAL SERVICE TO PROCEED IN ENGLAND OPPOSITION HYMNS SUNG VICAR MOBBED ON LEAVING BUILDING AND THROWN INTO CLUMP OF BUSHES

LONDON, March 22.—More than 1,200 people packed St. Cuthbert's Church, Darwin, and took part in a demonstration lasting over two and a half hours in protest against what a section of the congregation consider Roman Catholic tendencies in the services. The ordinary service was not held, and the sung Eucharist service, which commenced at half-past nine, was not concluded until after twelve o'clock.

Six or seven thousand people assembled outside the church and were controlled by a great body of foot and mounted police. When the service was at an end and the vicar, Rev. E. B. Lauria, came from the vestry into the churchyard he was rushed by a large body of the people who had attended the service and thrown through the trees into a clump of bushes. A number of police officers hurried to his protection, and in rescuing him Detective Inspector Fenton had his hand damaged and Detective Kenyon was injured.

PROTECTED BY POLICE

The vicar was almost dragged into the street, where he was at once surrounded by mounted and other police, who kept the boozing crowd away from him as he passed along the road in the direction of the vicarage. There were many skirmishes, but the horses frequently scattered the people, and the vicar was able to reach his home without further molestation.

The church was well filled long before the appointed time for commencing the sung Eucharist service.

The vicar, who had been on a propaganda tour in the south, was accompanied by his curate, Rev. A. Crawshaw, when he entered the church, along with the choir, to commence the sung Eucharist service. The opening hymn, "O God of Earth," was joined in by only a few of the hundreds in the pews, the others sitting quietly. The protest was commenced after about ten minutes, and then it was continued without a break for more than a couple of hours. Thirty-eight protested hymns

were sung, and for the two hours during which these were rendered the vicar stood in the pulpit without being able to deliver an audible message. All the time the chorists were seated in their stalls watching the scene, and it was only occasionally the tones of the organ were heard.

CLIPPING AND SINGING

More than once the vicar attempted to make a start with his address, but he was interrupted. He appeared to address himself to the section of the congregation who supported him and occupied pews in the front part of the church, but his remarks were inaudible, and after uttering a few sentences he resumed his waiting attitude. At the close of the singing of another hymn he again attempted to speak, but his words were drowned by an outburst of laughter and a renewal of the singing. At this point there was renewed clapping of hands. The vicar, however, continued speaking on the conclusion of another hymn, and after another had been commenced. After having been in the pulpit for nearly a couple of hours he left it.

The Eucharist was then celebrated by the curate. The interruption was constant whilst it was in progress. A series of hymns was sung, and the words of the celebrant, who had with him only a couple of servers, could not be heard. Occasionally the voices of the chorists and the organ could be heard in the conflict with the protesters, who, as the celebrant stood with his servers kneeling, sang: "God Save the King." Some of the congregation stood on the seats of the pews, watching the ceremonial, and there was an accompaniment of stamping feet as the great body of the protesters sang "Onward Christian Soldiers."

PARTY TO TAKE PICTURES HERE

STOLL-McCRACKEN EXPLORATION GROUP WILL LOOK OVER PRINCE RUPERT ON WAY NORTH

The Prince Rupert board of trade has been advised that the Stoll-McCracken Siberian and Arctic exploration party which will arrive in the city over the Canadian National Railways about April 10, to embark upon the schooner Morrissey, now on the way here from New York, will take several moving pictures in Prince Rupert before proceeding north. The party will be met by representatives of the board and it is possible some entertainment may be undertaken in their honor.

The party, led by Harold McCracken of the American Museum of Natural History of New York; Charles H. Stoll, wealthy New York sportsman and lawyer, and Capt. Robert A. Bartlett, who was with Capt. Peary at the North Pole in 1908, after leaving Prince Rupert, will spend six or seven months away from civilization. It is planned to visit Czar Nicholas II. Land, north of Siberia and about 500 miles from the North Pole, and Kamchatka Peninsula as well as other parts of the Arctic wastes.

WARSHIP EXPLOSION RESULTS IN DEATH

Two Men Killed and Ten Burned in Accident Aboard Destroyer at Cuban Port

WASHINGTON, March 22.—Two enlisted men are dead and five are suffering from serious burns while five others have minor burns as a result of an explosion aboard the destroyer tender Whitney at Guantanamo, Cuba.

MOTHER OF FAMOUS SCREEN STAR DEAD

Mrs. Charlotte Pickford Dies in Los Angeles Following Lengthy Illness With Cancer

LOS ANGELES, March 22.—Mrs. Charlotte Pickford, mother of Mary Pickford, famous screen star, died here today following a lingering illness with a cancerous growth. She was 55 years of age and was born in Toronto.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emption of that to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner. Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stampage.

HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
