PROPOSED NEW SCHOOL

To the Editor:-

The following is a copy of a letter which I have forwarded to Dr. Kergin, chairman of the school board:

Dear Sir,--As most unusual proceedings were taken by the majority of the trustees during your absence, I beg to place a few facts before you.

when I was invited to prepare drawings I was informed that the trustees had selected and invited three architects and I undertook to prepare the drawings on the following conditions:

(1.) That a day be specified for the lodging of all drawings at the same time.

(2.) That all drawings be hung at once, as usual in all competitions for public buildings, in some room where they could be examined by all interested citizens.
