



## Election Taking Place in United States Today of President and many Congressmen and other Officials

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—Forty-three million American voters are deciding today on a new administration at Washington and on the party that is to control the next Congress. They will elect a president, vice-president, 34 state governors and state senators, state representatives, and state officers in a seemingly endless procession.

Governor Smith voted on East Forty-eighth Street in New York and Hoover cast his ballot on the campus of Stanford University at Palo Alto, California. President Coolidge. voted in Northampton, Mass.

Special precaution has been taken to avoid trouble at various places where feeling runs high. The Texas Rangers were on duty near the Mexican border. Chicago is voting under protection of 11,000 civilian watchers and the guns of 4,000 policemen and federal agents. Nine machine gun squadrons cruised the south side of the Chicago area at meetings in the south end.
