POULTRY RANCH IS ESTABLISHED

FIVE HUNDRED BIRDS IMPORTED BY TERRACE MAN AS BASIS OF INDUSTRY

TERRACE, Aug. 10—Another shipment of laying pullets arrived on Wednesday for Murdo Smith, local rancher, and blacksmith here. This completes the order for five hundred chickens which Mr. Smith gave through Professor Lloyd of the University of B. C. The fowl are leghorns and are from a strain of heavy layers.

Mr. Smith has erected a large modern, well-lighted chicken house, 100 feet by 20 feet, which is equipped with all modern conveniences for the handling of the birds.

The results of the enterprise will be followed with keen interest by the local ranchers and citizens generally.

SADDLE MINE HASTINGS ARM

TRAMWAY TO BE COMPLETED IN ABOUT SIXTY DAYS AND WORK CONTINUING

The Silver Crest Mining Co., who for the past two seasons have been developing the Saddle property on Hastings Arm with such unusual success are proceeding rapidly with the construction of the aerial tramway and are also pushing development work at the mine, says the Alice Arm Herald. It is expected that the tramway will be in operation in about sixty days. This work is in charge of A. Knox formerly construction superintendent for the Granby Co.

At the mine, nine miners are at work drifting on the ore vein on which a shaft was sunk last year. This drift was commenced at a point 900 ft. south from the shaft and will give a depth on the ore of 200 ft. below the vein
