Do Newspapers

Tell the Truth?

In view of the many accusations that the newspapers have been lying recently, the following from the Vancouver World will be found interesting:

"Familiar in the newspaper office as the feverish tapping of the typewriter itself is the indignant correspondent or visitor who demands: 'Why don't the newspapers tell the truth?' The query is as old as Father William himself and double-somersaults in at the editorial door with the same ease and celerity as Lewis Carroll's brain-child.

"Why don't the newspapers tell the truth? The truth is that the newspapers do. The truth is that they exist for the sole purpose of telling the truth, that they gain their living by it and that just as soon as subscribers find Ananias is editor they withdraw their support, and there's an end on't.

"Where the public is apt to get befogged is in inability to distinguish opinion from fact. Two newspapers publishing the same facts will draw from them—just as two clergymen, or doctors, or lawyers—diametrically opposed opinions. The hasty reader fails to note that the facts agree, while the opinions differ; hence he says in his haste, 'All newspapers are liars.'

Throughout the strike in this city zeal for truth has burned brightly in the breasts of both the strikers and their opponents. What has been the result? Merely on the one side that the news has gone abroad over North America that this pleasant and peaceful city is keeping out of the grip of red revolution and soviet control only by the grim determination of its embattled citizens; and, on the other, that capital has got its machine guns trained on the labor headquarters, ready at the word of command to blow advocates of economic reform to smithereens!

"Does this represent the truth or the actual facts of the situation? We know not. Truth is not a so simple and readily-produced commodity as amateur publishers in their rosy inexperience are apt to think. Only trained minds can weigh truth and search out its meaning. And even judges (who, like the newspapers, exist for the purpose), are sometimes wrong.

"So with reputable newspapers. Being human they err; being fallible they now and then misreport; but being honest they—unlike some of our zealots for truth—are always ready to make amends."

Prisoners Will Be Tried Soon.

Press dispatches announce that U-boat captains and slayers of Edith Cavell and Capt. Fryatt are expected to be in the Tower of London within a few days. Hindenburg is offering himself in place of the former Kaiser. The criminals are reaping the result of their crimes. The mills of fate grind slowly and surely and this time fate is represented by the allied forces with the British Empire at the head.

The old Tower of London is the fortress that has swallowed up many kings and princes. Within its dungeons untold horrible deeds have been done. Now it is to be used as a place of retribution. The criminals will, however, have a fair trial and if not found guilty will be liberated.

Cost of Living High in Europe.

We think the cost of living is high here. A lady recently left for Scotland and thought to supply herself with clothes there, where the prices would be lower. On her arrival she soon found that instead of lower prices were higher in Scotland than here. What obtains in Scotland obtains everywhere in Europe. That is one of the chief causes of unrest, and it is largely brought about by the general scarcity of food and clothes.

In the old country butter is still very scarce and all other food is expensive. There is a depleted supply and under the law of supply and demand prices have advanced. Very soon this condition will be righted. The soldiers are gradually returning to productive labor and there is much less of the food and clothes being sent away. The waste of war is pretty nearly at an end and recovery, while not very quick, will be steady.

Under these difficult conditions it is the duty of governments to keep the prices as low as possible, to see that there is no profiteering and to legislate wisely with a view to allaying the unrest.
