## Somersaulted 28 Feet When Car Struck Stump; Two Killed, Three Hurt

UMBERLAND, B.C., May 14.—Charles Alfred Hanson, 21, and Lloyd Forsythe, 19, were killed and three companions severely injured when the car in which they were riding left the Vancouver highway near Sanhills below Union Bay, striking a stump and somersaulting 28 feet beyond.

The injured are Agner Hansen, whose leg is broken; Jack Forsythe, who has a sprained ankle and cuts and bruises. Both are in the hospital at Cumberland. William Ramsay is cut about the head and face and is at the hospital at Comox.

The five youths, whose ages range from 17 to 21 are all residents of Port Alberni. Charles Hansen was the driver.

Premier MacLean addressed the convention and said: "There is no need to hurry the choice on the score of the imminence of the provincial election. I do not know when it will come about. There is plenty of time to heal the divisions whiich are reported to exist and it may be that in a couple of weeks harmony will be restored. On the other hand if harmony does not prevail at the end of that time it might be good policy to call an open convention."
