constantly as it was their nature to be short-lived. Ore deposits were directly associated with what were known as igneous rocks which in the past as molten masses had come up to or near the crust from the lower stratas of the earth in volcanic matter. The speaker told of the effect of water and gasses such as sulphur in the formation of ore bodies. The water in solution carried the ores and, as the water escaped, deposits would be precipitated around the batholith. With the igneous material the ores were usually associated.

In British Columbia lay one of the most gigantic batholithic bodies in the world extending from the Fraser River on the south to the Yukon Territory on the north for a distance of 1100
