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NAVAL PROGRAM OF U.S. CURTAILED CONSTRUCTION OF LITTLE MORE THAN THIRD AUTHORIZED

United States Cuts Down on the Proposed Naval Extension Program Authorizing Only 16 New Vessels

WASHINGTON, February 23.—The House Naval Committee today decided to authorize the construction of fifteen cruisers and one aircraft carrier against 71 war vessels requested by the administration.

The cost of the authorized vessels is estimated at \$274,000,000 against \$740,000,000 proposed by the administration.

The question of naval extension has been much discussed since the failure of the proposed limitation of armaments treaty with Great Britain and Japan but the action of the committee has doubtless been influenced by the action of Great Britain in holding back on naval construction.

PRESBYTERIANS MAY CONTINUE

Decision in Saskatchewan Has Only a Local Significance Says Secretary

TORONTO, Feb. 23.—The decision of the Saskatchewan Legislature's committee that the title "Presbyterian Church in Canada" cannot be used, will not affect the church outside the province of Saskatchewan, said Rev. W. J. McNamara, secretary of the church's board of administration. He pointed out that the Presbyterian Church in Canada was not incorporated and never had been. The decision simply prevents suffering minorities in Saskatchewan from obtaining any relief through the legislature.

PAID \$100 FOR INDIAN WIFE

SEATTLE, Feb. 23.—Payment of \$100 to a mother-in-law does not insure non-appearance of a spouse in divorce proceedings. Harry Poy, Chinese, learned yesterday when he went before a judge in a divorce suit brought by his Indian wife, Tilla, formerly of Seward.

The former Alaskan girl charged that her hubby threatened to "chop her head off" on their nuptial night in 1918.

Evidence revealed that Poy took Tilla as his common law wife, four children having been born from the union which was legally solemnized last November.

Mrs. Poy claims to be a member of the Chilkat tribe. Poy stated in court that he had bought his wife from her mother for \$100.

Construction on Bear River Will Commence Within Eighteen Days and Next Year May go to Groundhog

VICTORIA, February 23.—The Portland Canal short line from Stewart East will ultimately be built to the Peace River district to provide an outlet to the coast. Following a conference yesterday, Lewthwaite, who is associated in the enterprise with H. H. Stevens, announced that construction to the Bear River summit would commence in eighteen days. Next year it would be built to the Groundhog, 129 miles from Stewart, and later be pushed into the Peace River country.

C.P.R. LEASES PARK FROM B.C.

Assiniboine Park on the Borders of Alberta to be Taken Over by Railway Company

VICTORIA, Feb. 23.—Assiniboine Park on the Alberta boundary will be leased to the C.P.R. Hon. T. D. Patullo, minister of lands, announced in the Legislature, when he introduced new parks legislation designed to put the administration of the provinces and pleasure areas on a broader and more workable basis. The minister at the same time withdrew the amendment to the Parks Act giving the Government power to cancel reserves of land for park purposes.
