FISH LANDING ARE LIGHT HERE TODAY

Halibut sales here today were light, totalling but 11,900 pounds. American boats were the Defence, which sold 7,000 pounds to the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., at 16.8c and 8c; the Glacier, which sold 3,500 pounds to the Booth Fisheries at 16.4c and 8c, and the Jack which received 16.1c and 8c for 400 pounds from the Booth Fisheries. The only Canadian boat was the Muirneag which was paid 17.1c and 9c by the Atlin Fisheries for 1,000 pounds.

The American boat Havana, not satisfied with the prices offering went on to Seattle with 15,000 pounds.


