VICTORIA. March 31.-"I am satisfled with the progress of Canadian products in the Chinese trade field and the prospect for an increase of trade is extremely good," Colonel Moore Cosgrove, Canadian, government trade commissloner to China and Horrg Kong said here on his arrival from the Orient. Cambridge Had Easy Victory in Eig Boat Race Today Several Oxford Men Being in Condition of Collapse at End

UTNEY, England, March 31. - Leading all the way Cambridge scored an easy victory of ten lengths over Oxford today in the eightieth annual boat race on the Thames. Cambridge covered the four-mile course in 20 minutes, 25 seconds, which was two minutes short of a record. The Cantabs, who were the favorites, the betting on them being three to one, never extended themselves, the Oxford crew being rowed out. After a desperate rally near the end they crossed the line with several men hanging over the sweeps in a collapsed condition.

NO LIMITATIONS SET IN DRAFT OF DOCUMENT SUBMITTED TO HIM, HE SAYS

OTTAWA, March 31 .- The reference of Premier King to the Egyptian treaty was not to the pact as finally drafted but to the treaty in its form during the preliminary negotiations and in the form in which it was presented to the government of Canada at that time. This was contained in a statement the Premier made in the House this afternoon in reply to a question by J. S. Woodsworth. In the draft as presented to Canada originally, said the Premier, there was no limitation as to the parts of the Empire to which the treaty might apply.
