Royal Ontario Museum, where it has been sent by the finder, Manly F. Miner of Kingsville, Ont. The giant was found on the shores of Lake Erie about three miles west of Kingsville, apparently washed up by a heavy storm. The fish, which is to be mounted by experts of the museum, is 6 feet 10 inches in length, and weighs 135 pounds. Sturgeon are becoming a rarity, it is said, owing to commercial fishing, and it is very seldom that they reach any great length, the average sturgeon caught in the Great Lakes being between four and five feet long. The great length of this specimen, together with certain physical characteristics, leads museum experts to believe that the monster is at least 75 years of age, and possibly more.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 8,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 5,000 feet per acre east of that range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE
Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes, minimum price for first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESTEAD LEASES
Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homesteads, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES
For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING
Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partly free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.

MUST NOT PRY INTO PRIVACY

JUDGE SUGGESTED MAN WHO DOES IT LIABLE TO GET A THRASHING

EDMONTON, April 30.—Detectives who go prying into private apartments, rooms or homes without search warrants to gather evidence for divorce proceedings lay themselves open to attack by the owner or occupant, according to Mr. Justice Tweedie.

His Lordship's declaration came at the end of a divorce action heard in the supreme court when the wife plaintiff was successful in her action.

The detective who had gathered the necessary evidence had just concluded his story in which he told of going to the door and on its being slightly opened by the occupant, pushing it gently open until he was able to pass himself into the room. Then he persuaded the husband to turn on a light and was able to obtain the evidence required.

Turning toward the witness His Lordship said, "Did you have a search warrant?"

"No, my lord."

"Then don't you be surprised if you walk into some place some day and can't walk out again. The law of this province does not entitle any detective, provincial, city or private to enter a place in the manner you have described to gather evidence. Some day some one will thrash you to a pulp and don't be surprised at that."

His Lordship then intimated that he would have very little sympathy with the detective under the circumstances.

OLD CUTTER BEAR IS AWAITING FATE

Some Disposition Will Have to be Made of Pioneer Craft by June 30

OAKLAND, Cal., April 30.—The cutter Bear, historic craft of the north Pacific, lies in the Oakland harbor facing an unknown fate.

On June 30, the vessel's fifty-fourth birthday, the coast guard will be forced to make some disposition of the vessel that has made 40 trips to Arctic regions to rescue stranded vessels, including that of the Greeley Polar expedition in 1883. Funds for its maintenance will not be available after that date, since congress has refused an appropriation to fit it with new boilers.

Coast guard officials, sentimentally attached to the old cutter, say it faces one of three fates. It may be scrapped, awarded a place of honor in a museum, or strengthened a bit in spots and sent upon Arctic expeditions in the interest of science.

The Bear was built in Scotland in 1874 and used first as a sealer.

MRS. WALTER RUNCIMAN A NATURAL POLITICIAN

New Member of Parliament for St. Ives Likely to Make Her Mark

LONDON, April 30.—Mrs. Walter Runciman, M.P., whose recent victory in the by-election in the St. Ives division of Cornwall was a notable one and brought her into the House of Commons as the first married woman member sitting in the House at the same time as her husband, Rt. Hon. Walter Runciman, M.P., has personal gifts that are likely to enable her to make her mark in politics. A daughter of a former member for South Shields, Mrs. Runciman entered on her career in a tradition of public service, and took a first class in the History Tripos at Cambridge when university education for women was still in its infancy. Keenly interested in education, she was the first woman member of the New-castle-on-Tyne School Board and became a member of the Northumberland County Education Committee. She was on the first list of women magistrates, and is president of the Free Church Women's Council, having been for many years a bulwark of the temperance movement. She is past-president of the Women's Liberal Federation, and a member of the Executive Committee of the Liberal £1,000,000 Fund, and has devoted a large part of her capacity for hard work to politics and the Liberal cause.
