## Junior Football League Holds Annual Banquet When Addresses On Sportsmanship Are Delivered

The annual banquet of the Junior Football League with the presentation of the Rochester shield and medals took place on Saturday evening in the Boston Cafe. There were present members of the three teams from Booth, High and Borden Schools to the number of over fifty boys and in addition H. B. Rochester, Mayor McMordie, Miss E. A. Mercer, Miss S. A. Mills, Mrs. J. R. Boddie, S. D. Macdonald, Geo. W. Johnstone, W. Reid, A. Sharples, A. Hallerman and W. W. C. O'Neill. O Canada was sung and then attention was directed to the business of disposing of the tables which was attended satisfactorily. The president, J. S. Wilson, welcomed the guests on behalf of the executive and then led the assembly in community singing.

Mr. Wilson asked Mr. Rochester to present the shield to the captains of High and Booth Schools who tied at the end of last season and who were declared joint holders of the Rochester trophy. The competition had been very keenly fought out and had been productive of an excellent brand of football.

Mr. Rochester expressed his great pleasure at once more being able to be present at the banquet. He knew of no other single event that had given him so much pleasure as the keen competition for the shield which he had presented a number of years ago. It gave him real satisfaction and the splendid play of the boys was a rich reward to him. He had sincere pleasure in asking W. Fisher, representing High School, and Tony Bussanich, representing Booth school to receive the shield. To Borden was equal honor and credit due for they had played hard and well and in the right spirit.

The chairman then called on Mayor McMordie to present the medals to the members of the High and Booth teams. Before doing so, Col. McMordie said he had thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity of being with the boys that evening. He had also had the pleasure of seeing the boys play during the season and complimented them on the quality of their play and the equally high standard of sportsmanship displayed. The lessons of the hard and cleanly fought out games would be of practical value when they were engaged in the more serious battles of business and pleasure after school days were over. Col. McMordie then presented the medals to the boys and complimented several on their creditable showing in senior football during the summer.

Mr. Sharples of the High School staff then rendered a pianoforte solo in brilliant style, a number that was greatly enjoyed by all present.

On behalf of the Prince Rupert Football Association the Vice president, W. Reid expressed his regret that the president, W. E. Willisroft had not been able to attend but he was glad to have the opportunity himself to congratulate the boys on their good showing and was glad that, he had been able, by helping with the football grounds, to be of practical use to the boys. He reminded the boys of the debt they owed to the old-timers—W. E. Willisroft, the late George Cochrane, and Jack Campbell—in starting the competition.

**Value of Games**


