TROUBLE SOUTH AFRICAN CABINET CAUSES RESIGNATION

Color Line Cause of Cabinet Resignation in South Africa Tomorrow

PRETORIA, South Africa, Nov. 5.—The Nationalist Labor coalition Government under Premier J. B. Hertzog today decided to resign tomorrow. This does not necessarily mean an election but is the result of internal dissension and will be followed by a general reorganization. In the new Government which is to be formed by Premier Hertzog, Hon. E. B. Madley will be missing. He is the minister of Public Works and Telegraphs and his omission is due to the fact that he failed to comply with the Premier's request to resign because of his action in dealing with the postal workers through the native workers' union.

Official Welcome is Given to British High Commissioner by Canada at a Dinner in Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 5.—Canada on Saturday night gave Official welcome to the first High Commissioner from Great Britain to the Dominion, at the Government dinner presided over by Premier King and attended by members of the Cabinet and by Conservatives leader R. B. Bennett and others of prominent political, social, and business life of the Dominion, Sir William Clark and all the members of his family were accorded an eloquent and hearty welcome to Canada. The importance of the step which was

taken by the British Government in the vappoinment of a High commissioner found expression in the speech of Premier King, who welcomed the guests on behalf of the government.

"Were I to express in words words my feelings as to the significance of the appointment to Canada of a High commissioner for Great Britain I would say I believed it by far the most important step yet taken to further the effective consultation and co-operation between the government of His Majesty in Canada and the government of His Majesty in Great Britain with resultant benefits to both. And what is even more important to the unity of the Empire as a whole it is the most effective means thus far devised of securing the crown against involvement in any possible... Imcoissmonilwoyrble controversy which may ever arise between different governments of which His Majesty is head. If closer relations of governments of the Empire and the maintenance of its unity through the security of the crown are what we all desire may we not truly say that they find their surest as well as their latest developments," said the Premier.

Creation of the post would serve to knit firmer and stronger bond with the British Empire was the opinion of Conservative Leader Bennett, who joined in words of welcome.

"If one required a new motto for the Empire it would be, 'Liberty, Equality and Co-operation,'" said Sir William in the course of his speech in which he thanked the Government and people of Canada for their welcome.

Vancouver Police Reinstated Until New Commission Meets After the Beginning of Year

VANCOUVER, Nov. 5.—Eight of the senior officers of the Vancouver police force superannuated recently were reinstated by the police commission today until a new commission meets after the beginning of the year.

Corporation Counsel George E. McCrossan's six page digest of R. S. Lennie's 60 page report on the police inquiry was left for consideration of the new commissioners. Former detective John Robertson, who was dismissed and then reinstated received reinstatement as a first class constable on the understanding that he returns to a position which will not require him to testify in court, Police Commissioner T. W. Fletcher, in moving Robertson's reinstatement said he had a good record and he did not think he wilfully lied on the stand in the Gilmore case but had changed his mind on the stand and acted on bad judgment.

PLANE CRASHED CROOKS CANYON

Yankee Doodle Flew for Only Four Hours on Return to New York

PRESCOTT, Ariz, Nov. 5.—The monoplane Yankee Doodle, holder of the east and west record for trans-continental flight, which started from Los Angeles Saturday evening in an attempt to make a west to east record to New York in nineteen hours, crashed four hours after take off in Crook Canyon. Captain C. B. Collier the pilot and Harry Tucker the owner of the plane were both killed.

Collier with John Smears last July completed a record time trip around the world which ended in New York in 23 days and 15 hours.
