The month of November was a busy one at the public library, the total output of books for the month being 4,023 an average of 201.1 each day, the librarian reported to the Board last night. While most of this was fiction there were in addition 408 nonfiction books, 897 juvenile and

192 in the duplicate department. During the month books were added, one by gift and 88 by purchase, making a total collection after allowing for 23 discarded of 6,491 volumes.
