## Graf Zeppelin Dodging Storm Areas After Driving Before a Howling Gale Throughout Night

BERLIN, Oct. 30.—Dodging storm areas but aided by strong tail winds the homeward bound Graf Zeppelin was swinging over the Atlantic along the northern routes today. It was estimated she had covered about half the distance from Lakehurst, N. J. Weather reports were none too favorable.

The Zeppelin had driven most of the night with the gale howling behind her but there were no reports indicating that storm conditions were bothering the ship unduly.
