THEATRE IS TO RE-OPEN

Permission having been granted by the provincial fire marshal's department to use the downstairs portion of the house but not the balcony and gallery, Col. S. P. McMorde, manager of the Westholme Theatre, announces that the theatre will be reopened tonight under these conditions. The pit of the house has accommodation for 375 persons and, in order to take care of patronage, it has been decided to run three shows nightly commencing at 6 p.m. instead of two as has been the custom.

Meantime, it is expected that the management of the theatre will proceed in the near future with work that it has been ruled must be done before the whole house can be used. This work will include extensive alterations to the floor of the gallery as well as the putting in of two fire exits on either side to the front of the building. Carrying out of this work, it is expected will not interfere with the use of the pit of the theatre.
