Galloway Rapids Bridge to be Built This Year and Road the Other Side Continued Says T. D.

MINIMUM WAGE ACT IN FORCE

SAID THAT 2500 MEN WILL BE AFFECTED BY IT IN CATERING BUSINESS

VICTORIA, March 29.—The latest order of the board administering the minimum wage act will go into effect on Sunday, April 1, in the catering business of British Columbia. It provides a minimum wage for all catering employees of 32½ cents an hour for a straight shift or 35 cents for a split shift, where free meals are provided. Where meals are not provided the rate will be 40c. for a straight shift or 32½c. for a split shift.

It is estimated that 2500 men will be covered by the order, probably one half of them having wages affected by the order.

It is reported that some hotels are planning to replace men with women in kitchen jobs as women are paid less under the women's minimum wage act.

CAPTIVES DIE AT SOLOMONS

CHIEF AND TEN MEN ARRESTED FOR KILLING BRITISH SUCCUMB DYSENTERY

TULAGI, Solomon Islands, March 29.—Chief Norlu and ten natives, who were arrested in connection with a massacre of British officials at Sinarago on the northeast coast of Malaita Island last year, have died in captivity. Twenty-six natives are sick today. The illness it is understood is dysentery caused by a diet of goat meat and lack of exercise.

DON Q BRINGS HER FIRST HALIBUT TRIP

The Alaska Fishing boat Don Q, captain Sandwick, which made her first trip to port with halibut today, has for the past two years been sending out of Petersburg. She is 42 feet long of the same type. Her engine is a 27 horse power gasoline. The vessel is two years old.

ALASKANS GET JUDGMENT IN EASTERN CITY

AWARDED \$600 FOR TEAM OF HUSKIES BORROWED FROM THEM IN FAR NORTH

NEW YORK, March 29.—Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Magda, fur raisers in Decatur, Alaska, were rewarded for a six thousand mile march to this city. The reward was a judgment of \$600 in the municipal court, the value of a team of thirteen huskies and sled borrowed they said, by Louis Rotman a year ago and not returned later as promised.

Rotman wanted the team for a journey to Nenana in the capacity of fur buyer for a New York firm.

NEW LORD CHANCELLOR APPOINTED IN ENGLAND

Lord Cave, Who is Reported in Sinking Condition, Becomes an Earl

LONDON, March 29.—Sir Douglas Hogg, attorney general, has been appointed Lord Chancellor, succeeding Lord Cave, who resigned on account of ill health.

Sir Thomas Inskip, solicitor general, is appointed new attorney general, and Frank Herriman is the new solicitor general.

The King has conferred an earldom on Lord Cave, who is reported to be in a sinking condition today.

Bloody Battle in Mexican State of Juana Juato in Which 92 Insurgents, Two Priests and Officers Are Killed

MEXICO CITY, March 29.—Despatches from Irapuato, Guanajuato, today said 92 insurgents, two Roman Catholic priests, a chieftain, Romingo Anaya, two army officers and four soldiers were killed in the bloodiest battle since the insurgents became active.

Forty insurgents were wounded and captured in fighting on a ranch near San Francisco del Rincon, Tuesday and Wednesday.

Military authorities declare the battle dealt a death blow to the uprising in the state of Guanajuato. Insurgents numbering three hundred fought desperately for 29 hours. The fighting spread to the roof tops until finally it was confined to a church on the ranch where the leaders succumbed.

WAR IS AGAIN UNDER DEBATE

MISS McPHAIL WITHDRAWS MOTION FOR CREATION OF PEACE DEPARTMENT

OTTAWA, March 29.—After another debate in the House of Commons, Miss Agnes McPhail withdrew her motion for the creation of a department for the promotion of peace.

Miss McPhail expressed a hope that between now and next session the government would set up some agency to tell what was being done for the promotion of peace. Miss McPhail said: "While we have the superiority complex which nothing can puncture, there will always be danger of war, but it cannot be true that we can always be right."

Women, Miss McPhail said, were keenly aware of war. They placed higher value on human life because they suffered so much for it and for this reason they should have a voice in Parliament. The sacrifices of 1914 to 1918 should be crystallized into something which should prevent recurrence of war.

LONDON, March 29.—The British steamer Sagua La Grande, posted at Lloyds as missing is believed to have sprung a leak and foundered during a storm on her way from Philadelphia to Halifax on January 22. She carried a cargo of coal and a crew of fifteen.

Fierce Struggle with Burglar as House Burns; Dog Saved Situation by Attack and Wounded When Man Driven Off

SOUTH VANCOUVER, March 29.—Steve Pelech, a garage man, was clubbed with the butt of a revolver and badly mauled by a burglar whom he discovered in the basement. His dog, which probably saved his life by attacking the intruder, was wounded and Pelech's house was set on fire by the upsetting of an incubator during the struggle.

The fight took place at Pelech's home on Knight Road at 2.30 this morning. The two fought while the flames from the incubator swept up the walls until the dog attacked. The burglar fired but failed to hit the dog which chased him outside where the burglar fired again, wounding the animal. The flames were put out by the fire department.

Dominion is to Give a Million Dollars to Construct New Highway

North and South to be Connected by Road From Golden to Mount Robson With Federal Aid

VICTORIA, March 29.—Construction of an automobile highway up the big bend of the Columbia River from Golden to Mount Robson and Jasper Parks so as to create a new route from British Columbia to Alberta and open up the vast mineral and timber areas, will be undertaken by the British Columbia government in co-operation with the Federal government. Announcement to this effect was made by the Times here last evening.

The paper says it has learned that this scheme is part of a federal government program which is expected to include the taking over of Mount Robson and Mount Assiniboine Parks from the province.

Ottawa proposes to spend nearly a million dollars in assisting the province to construct the highway, the Times says.

B.C. COAL OPERATORS NOT ASKING RATE ON PRODUCT TO THE EAST

OTTAWA, March 29.—Those engaged in coal operations in B.C. have not made representations as to getting in to the eastern market was the answer given by the government yesterday to a question asked by Neil of Comox-Alberni as to whether or not the government would extend the test movement rate on Alberta coal from B.C. with a pro rata increase for the extra distance.

SUVA, March 29.—The American steamer Steelmaker bound from Noumea, New Caledonia to Honolulu was wrecked on Mitchell reef, Ellice Island group. The crew was not endangered.

CHINESE WITNESS SUPPOSED TO BE TAKING OATH USED WORDS WHICH BROUGHT RETORT

GUN PRODUCED IN COURT

REPRIMAND GIVEN BY JUDGE AND EVIDENCE PROCEEDED IN CASE AT VICTORIA

VICTORIA, March 29.—Yu Cheong Leong, official interpreter, believing himself cursed by a prosecution witness while performing the rites of a Chinese oath, moved for his gun in court here today during the trial of Chew Leong Sing, charged with the attempted murder of Wong Lim here on February 5. He stopped himself and apologized to the court.

Yu Wai, the witness, was standing with an axe poised about to strike the head off the sacrificial bird when he was heard to say something in Chinese. "Now, Yu Cheong, I chop your head off" were the words used by the witness. Yu Cheong told police officers afterwards.

The interpreter, refraining himself after starting forward, said: "If you do that again I will shoot you down." He called this in English.

Yu Cheong said he was cursed by witness yesterday in a similar manner. The oath was administered again, Yu Wai going through it this time without comment.

Mr. Justice McDonald delivered a reprimand.

The trial is continuing with the courtroom guard doubled.

Yu Cheong, who is the official translator for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in Vancouver, produced a permit for the possession of the revolver he carried and agreed to disarm himself for the rest of the trial.

BRUCE REBUKES HIS PREDECESSOR

PRESENT AUSTRALIAN PREMIER DUBS STATEMENT OF HUGHES FALSE AND DAMAGING

CANBERRA, March 29.—Premier Bruce strongly deprecated a speech of Former Premier Hughes at the National Labor Conference in Sydney yesterday when he opposed Italian immigration and alleged that an arrangement had been made between the government of Italy and Australia to allow immigrants from Italy to enter the Commonwealth at the rate of three hundred per month. The Premier characterized the statement as incorrect and said that such remarks on international affairs by a former premier might have a disastrous effect.

"Don't be too rash in peace time about introducing legislation which may abrogate tried and proved military procedure,"—Vice-President Daves.
