He was desirous of offering his tribute to the work of the Prince Rupert General Hospital and its lady superintendent, Miss Harrison, to whom the credit was due that Prince Rupert graduates should be the equal of those turned out from any other institution in the country. To the three young ladies who now graduated he extended the best of wishes for success and happiness in their chosen calling.

A pleasing violin solo was then rendered by Fred H. Smith with Miss Lora Tite accompanying.

### MR. WILSON'S ADDRESS

In making an earnest and feeling address to the graduating class, Rev. A. Wilson, pastor of First United Church, congratulated the three young ladies on their success in qualifying for the profession which was one of the worthiest callings. Though young in its scientific and modern sense, the nursing profession was already imbued with many wonderful traditions. In another sense, the calling was as old as time, coming down from the first wife and mother for the care of her child and family. The speaker briefly traced the history of the profession from the deacons and deaconesses of the early Scriptures who attended and ministered to the sick, then the institutions of monastic character, in the eighteenth century when the calling was in disrepute and hospital conditions were unspeakable, on to 1873 when science was introduced into the profession in Germany, the system spreading to England and later throughout the world, mainly as a result of the work of the great Florence Nightingale. In the past one hundred years the attitude of the public had changed until now the calling had aroused general interest and admiration. The profession had made wonderful progress and its standards had been greatly raised. Just as science and civilization should advance so would this great army of women go marching on in their work of aiding humanity throughout the world.

In addition to its primary purpose, the training and experience of the nurse qualified the disciples of the profession for a citizenship of an even higher order. When they should become wives, their training would not be forgotten but would serve them in good stead in their homes. They would continue to preserve their traditions of service.

### PERSONALITY

The speaker referred to the aid to and dependence of medical science on the nurse. Technique and personality were most important factors. Upon the spirit of the nurse often depended the gaining of co-operation from the patient in his extremity, as sympathetic understanding was required. The speaker also urged cultivation of the spiritual side of life. The nurse should remember that it was not merely a patient that she was called upon to minister to but a human being with all the frailties and peculiarities going therewith. The profession, like all others, also had its temptations to overcome which, as well as to aid in other senses, inspiration, stimulation, high ideals and the spirit of service were all necessary.

Following the address, there was a vocal solo by Mrs. H. N. Brocklesby, accompanied by Mr. Brocklesby.

Each graduate was then in turn presented with her diploma by J. H. Thompson, president of the hospital board, who made brief and appropriate congratulatory remarks. The nurses were also invested with their medals by the lady superintendent, Miss Jean Harrison, R.N. Applause greeted each of the recipients.

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. J. R. Frizell.
