BANQUET FOR DR. TREMAYNE

ENTHUSIASTIC FUNCTION, TINGED WITH REGRET, HELD LAST EVENING—PRESENTATIONS MADE

Prominent pioneer business and professional men of Prince Rupert to the number of about sixty gathered last evening at a banquet in the Commodore Cafe to give an enthusiastic and feeling farewell to Dr. H. E. Tremayne, physician and surgeon of this city since 1905 who is moving to William Head quarantine station near Victoria this evening. Presentations were made to both Dr. and Mrs. Tremayne and there were a number of speeches in which sincere regret that they were leaving Prince Rupert and hearty best wishes for the future were combined. The banquet started at 7 p.m. and concluded about 10. G. W. Nickerson acted as toastmaster and others responsible for the arrangement of the function included J. H. Pillsbury, C. H. Orme, E. C. Gibbons, J. W. Scott, C. V. Eviit and J. C. McLennan.

Dr. W. T. Kergin made the principal speech of the evening and presented Dr. Tremayne with a handsome alligator club bag for himself and a silver tea tray for Mrs. Tremayne. Dr. Kergin gave some interesting reminiscences of early days here and told how in 1903 he had come north on the same vessel—the old steamer Tees—with Dr. Tremayne. The latter landed at Metlakatla to a small boat in a raging southeast gale. Dr. Kergin himself went on to Port Simpson. The speaker referred to the prominent part the departing guest had played in the building up of this community and the general esteem in which he was held.

J. W. Scott told of first meeting Dr. Tremayne thirty years ago back in Ontario. They were playing "post-office" at a party.

M. P. McCaffery paid a fitting tribute to Dr. Tremayne. He was generous, popular and widely esteemed as he was known. There were few people in Prince Rupert who did not regret his departure. Mr. McCaffery referred to the landing away back in the early days of himself and Dr. Tremayne. The
