



OBOURG, Ont., May 2.—By a poll of 11 to 1 the civilian jury yesterday rendered a verdict against W. T. R. Preston, writer of the defamatory article which appeared June 13 in the Port Hope Guide entitled "Mons" and against the publisher of the paper, F. W. Wilson.
