OFFICIAL LIST BOXING CHAMPS

BRITISH ENTHUSING OVER GAME WITH ADVENT OF HEENEY AS CONTENDER

LONDON, April 11.—After a long period of quiescence, British boxing is once again being infused with vitality. All is well, of course, with the amateurs who have never shown such high promise since the war as today.

But there is also a marked stimulation among the professionals. New names are at last coming to the fore. Championship bouts are staged in quick succession. Titles change hands, and it seems that all is in the preparation for some new and vital phase in British boxing. A new British champion, Tom Heenev, has suddenly leapt into the limelight to uphold our boxing prestige, to shatter the myth of the American superman, to exercise our inferiority complex, and to challenge the supremacy of the best of the American heavyweight fighters.

The British Board of Boxing Control has reached to this new spirit, and after an important discussion has issued an official list of British champions, which is as follows:

The event will be over a mile and a quarter route accruing \$4,000 in added money with promise of a gross value of more than \$10,000 after entry fees are received.

The field will bring out some smart three year-olds and over including Chance Shot, winner of the Belmont, Whiskery, Kentucky Derby winner, Black Maria, victor of the Metropolitan handicapped, Brooms, Hopeful winner, Nimbo, winner of the Realization, and Crusader, the best son of the famous Man O' War.

Around The World With Sport Fans

English titled men are represented in the ring today by Lord Knebworth, 25 year old heir to the Earl of Lytton, who recently won a four round bout from Policeman Bone in England.

Francis Ouimet, the veteran golf player and former golf champion of the world, has a plan for a golf links which will be partly in the United States and partly in Canada. The Club house will be in Canada and one hole of the course. The result is that members of the club will be able to get any brand they wish under the Quebec laws. It is to be known as the Richford Frontier Club.

Highland Scott, a member of the ultra-select two-minute list, and Winnipeg, the Canadian star, have been made equal favorites for the fourth renewal of the \$25,000 American Pacing Derby to be contested at Kalamazoo, July 17. Grattan Bars, another Canadian whirlwind, is held next in favor. Berry the Great, race-day favorite for the 1927 Derby; Jean Grattan, and Daisy Grattan are next. Trumpet, the fast trotter owned by the Pittsburg sportsman, J. D. Callery, is scheduled to join the stable of the Canadian reinsman, Vic Fleming, at the North Randall course, Cleveland. He is staked in both the Grand and Orange County circuits.

Tom Heenev, who came into particular prominence recently through the announcement that he would be the contender against Gene Tunney for the heavyweight championship this summer, is less well known than any that formerly competed for the title. He is 29 years of age, has been boxing for seven years, and was comparatively unknown on this continent until a year ago. His rise has been truly meteoric, for on the results of nine bouts in the United States he is catapulted into a championship match. In the seven years of his ring career he has engaged in thirty-three bouts, of which 16 were won by him on decisions or fouls and ten by knockouts. The New Zealander has engaged in four drawn battles, and lost three.

SPORT CHAT

Capt. Angus Walters of the crack Nova Scotia sailing schooner Bluenose has announced his willingness to enter the ocean race from Sandy Hook to

Spain if a purse of \$10,000 is subscribed. Soliciting subscriptions is already under way with \$1,000 from the MacDonald Tobacco Company heading the list. The race is being sponsored by King Alfred of Spain, and the King and Queen are prepared to welcome the winners to Spanish soil and present trophies to the victors. The race, for fishing schooners, is some 3,200 miles long. Senior Don Alejandro Padilla, Spanish Ambassador to Washington, is chairman of the racing committee.

Players of the Vancouver Senior Amateur Baseball League have something to look forward to this year. It has been decided to do away with individual prizes this season, and instead send four players of the winning team East to witness the world's series. This plan will be brought forward in a perfected state soon. Mayor Taylor is to be asked to pitch the first ball in the opening game April 21. An outside umpire is to be brought in for the season. Efforts will be made to secure a Coast League arbiter, and he will be given instructions to enforce the rules to the limit, especially with regard to taken by batters and pitchers.
