The active practice of witchcraft for the purpose of curing sickness and ills has been discontinued now for many years among the natives of his district states W. E. Collison, Indian Agent. Mr. Collison's district includes the Naas River, mouth of the Skeena River and the coast adjoining Prince Rupert. Such demonstrations as dancing are unknown and the picturesque figure known as the medicine man is a mat-Wheels Standard | ter of antiquity as far as this district is concerned. "The natives now pride themselves as being above such beliefs and practice," states Mr. Collison. The natives, in fact, are now most unwilling to even demonstrate or go through the antics of the ancient medicine man.

> Though superstition, bred down through the ages, and the belief in necromancy is not yet entirely rooted out, there is, however, no actual practice of such in the district. No Indian now would go further than to possibly accuse another's bad spirits for causing death and even such an incident would be rare. Civilization and Christian beliefs have been firmly implanted and few of the ancient customs remain.


